

# SHORT STORY.....Part 2

#### A WALK ON THE WILD SIDE

The smell was of cheese and tea, still sold loose, and flavouring the air. Behind and above him were shelves stocked with skein's of knitting wool, mainly in blue and grey, used in the hand knitted jerseys worn by all the men. These were knitted in various patterns although to him there was no significance in this. It was merely how things were. As in most cottage crafts the interest and stories behind the knitting patterns went almost unrecognised until the art of hand knitting had almost totally disappeared. It has been claimed that so distinctive were the local patterns that if the sea gave up the body of a fisherman lost overboard that at least his home port could be identified by the pattern of the jersey he wore. However, this was of no interest to him at his age. More important was the purchase of some provisions for his journey, a bar of chocolate, a packet of shortbread and a bottle of lemonade. He was now ready to depart.

Back then towards the centre of the village. Across the Greenie, across the bridge over the burn where the water ran clear, a few partan shells the only detritus on the bed of the small stream. Up past the red telephone kiosk nestling under the lee of the hill, where, in the late autumn, wives would queue on a Saturday evening, waiting for a phone call from their husbands in distant East Anglia pursuing the herring shoals, and on to the path leading up from the village to the fields above. Up he climbed his back to the sea until he came to the first turn in the path which brought him round to face the sea. There in front of him, across the bay, the old ruined church on the side of Mhor. Down below him the two valleys or "dens", from each of which ran a small stream to converge just above the village and enter the sea as one at the ruined pier. The stream from the Bracoden ran straight down and was joined by the other, appearing from below a small culvert by the side of a house, at right angles. When a crowd of boys were together they would knock sods of grass and red earth off the surrounding banks and dam the burn at the Bracoden. This, however, was less fun than damming the other burn. When this was done and a considerable weight of water had built up behind the dam, it eventually burst sending a torrent of red, muddy water cascading downstream, through the culvert and sometimes up to the door of the nearby house. This would inevitably arouse the wrath of the good lady, who would threaten the gang with all sorts of dire consequences never, as far as I am aware, carried out. Such frivolities were not for him today however as he reached the next turn in the path and started inland again. Here to the side of him was Hildas yardie, a small piece of ground lovingly cultivated by one of the women from the village. Set fairly high on the slope, the vegetables were protected from the winds by sheets of plywood set on edge. The whole was covered by a canopy created from old fishing nets to deter birds and butterflies. Still climbing he now passed banks of whin bushes, a mass of yellow blossom, with their faint vanilla smell drifting in the breeze. These also played a small part in the economy of the village. When the sharp spiny foliage died back in the Winter the bushes could be set alight, burning off the spines and once the rain had washed the stems clean, they made superb kindling. Rabbits scampered along the fence edge, bringing a smile to his face as he remembered the day when, along with his pal, they had uprooted twenty or thirty snares set along the line of the fence, taken them down to the village in great secrecy, and dumped them into the sea from the old pier - a small victory for animal rights. Now the ground was flatter as he headed towards the final climb to the top of the headland. To his left there was a small grassy drop of about twenty feet forming a semi-circular natural amphitheatre before the cliff dropped again towards the east end of the village.

Over £400 was raised a final amount will be published at a later date.



# HYDROGEN PROJECT FOR STRONSAY

By now most folks in Stronsay will be aware of the brainstorming idea to apply to the lottery fund (Living Landmarks) to become one of the first communities to be powered by hydrogen. Orkney Today did an article on the subject a few weeks ago. To start at the beginning, in 2004 Orkney Islands Council granted planning permission to erect six additional wind turbines on Rothiesholm. The Scottish Executive later made recommendation this should be reduced to three or four It is the view of the Stronsay renewables group that as much benefit as is possible should be retained in the Island. At the moment the grid capacity of the submarine cable is nearing its limits with very little hope (in the near future) of an upgrade making it unpractical to feed more electricity into it.

Continued from previous page To this end we have come up with this idea (grant of finance from Living Landmark allowing) to erect three wind turbines the power of which would be used to convert water by electrolyser into hydrogen which would be stored for use in fuelling the Islands needs. Combustion engines can be converted to run on hydrogen gas quite easily as can any form of gas or oil burning appliance used for water heating or cooking. As an option for making some revenue to the Island some of the stored hydrogen could be used (in low wind speeds when the turbines already in Stronsay and the ones in Sanday are not generating much power) to power a gas turbine to generate electricity to sell to the grid. There is another idea to replace the next Island ferry with a hydrogen powered one but this needs a lot of discussion on feasibility and continuity of supply of fuel etc. This is where you the people of Stronsay come in, the renewables group are asking you to support their idea in becoming self sufficient in fuel and power. It is imperative that the application is supported by the vast majority of Stronsay inhabitants. As there is the chance to receive funding from £10 up to £25 million this may be our golden opportunity to move our Island from the "edge" and set it at the forefront of technology, enhancing tourism and playing host to research and development in hydrogen uses. This would inevitably increase the population of the Island and generate greater profitability. Other spin offs are for every cubic mtr of gas produced one cubic mtr water at 30 deg C is generated. This could be used for projects such as the abalone as reported in the Orcadian last week. Another use could be to heat poly tunnels or the like enabling us to grow produce all year round. As a consultation the members of the Stronsay Renewables Group will be available to answer any questions or hear the views from you the public. We will be at the Community Centre on the evening Sat 17th and afternoon Sun 18th. Please feel free to drop in and give us a grilling (as long as you use hydrogen)

- · offer inspirational design solutions which respect and enhance the physical environment and the community
- · promote sustainability through lasting improvements to the physical environment and quality of life
- are committed to learning from past experience of projects and ongoing monitoring and evaluation.

To be eligible for funding under this programme your project must meet all of these programme priorities.

# A Christmas Tree Concert in the New Kirk

Before 1929

There were two Churches in Stronsay affectionately known as the Old Kirk and the New Kirk. The Old Kirk is still standing below Linkshouse but as it was no longer required after the joining of the churches it was turned into a barn. The New Kirk was demolished to make room for the present Moncur Memorial Church which was opened in 1955.

This story is about what we called the New Kirk in 1926. I was a pupil in the South School and with our good teacher Miss Fotheringhame we had been practising all the Christmas carol's and then joined with the central school pupils for the concert, my brother being one of them. What excitement it was entering the Church with the lovely Christmas tree with presents on the branches, the glow of the oil lamps and candles and looking around at all the people sitting in the pews. We sang all our carols and then Santa Claus appeared. Somehow word had got round that he had got a new baby grandson and Miss Fotheringhame had chosen me to present him with a toy rattle for the baby. I was not too sure of the man in the long red coat and white beard but I stood up on the seat beside my brother and handed over the present saying a few words for which he thanked me.
