
ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL MACMILLAN FUNDRAISER FOR SHEENA & JULIA

On Friday 29th September, Sheena Cooper and Julia Wild held their annual coffee morning at 'Sunnyside' to raise much needed funds for the MacMillan Cancer Unit in Kirkwall. They did their first fundraising for the Cancer Unit approximately six years ago by completing a 20 mile walk around Stronsay and managed then to raise in the region of £1000.

Later that year they decided to hold their first coffee morning, this event raised a further £100.

Since then they have held a coffee morning on a yearly basis which continued to raise money and has increased by approximately £100 per year since then.

In 2005 they raised £622.61p.



Julia works in the Kirkwall MacMillan Unit and see's and understands the everyday needs of the unit. Living areas are provided for patients and families, these areas have been made as comfortable as possible. A new conservatory has been erected also new bedding and curtains have been purchased along with flat screen televisions with integrated free view. These have all been purchased out of the fund that all money raised goes into.

Everyone knows of someone who's life is touched by cancer, and so the cause is close to most peoples hearts.

At the Coffee Morning / Evening there were sales tables, raffles and refreshments. It was a very enjoyable event to attend. During the morning session 24 people attended and the evening was even busier.

Lots of donations were sent by people who couldn't attend for one reason or another. The fundraiser has always been held at 'Sunnyside' and since leaving Stronsay Julia has always returned to join Sheena for the event.

Money has continued to come in and the total raised at the time of printing is

£701

Over £2,100 has been raised between 2000 and 2006 making a total to date of over £2800

Thankfully Cancer sufferers have a good support system throughout Orkney. We need to ensure this continues and it will as long as people like Sheena and Julia have anything to do with it.

A REQUEST FROM DR BUCHAN

I am grateful to Heather and Yvonne for allowing me to use the Limpet to let you know of my plans.

For two days in November, soon after I finish my spell on Stronsay, I am going on a GP refresher course. There will be twelve doctors on the course to be held in a hotel in Keswick, Cumbria. As part of our training in communication skills each of us has been asked to bring a video recording of two consultations. We will study the recordings together and decide what was well done and what could be improved.

I need to video some consultations so that I can select two for the course. I cannot do this unless you give written permission for me to do so.

If you come to see me while I am at Geramount I will give you a form that asks you to sign to say that you agree to me recording us. This will be a record only of our conversation. No examination will be taped.

If you do not want to sign the form you do not have to. There will be no reward for signing but no penalty for not signing. Even if you have signed you can ask me to turn off the camera should you find yourself saying things you would rather not have recorded.

There should be no difference from normal. I have been through this exercise before and, surprisingly, you soon forget all about the presence of the camera.

All the doctors who will see the tape are bound by strict rules of confidentiality. It must help that none of them is likely to know you. I am the only one likely to be embarrassed but I knew that when I signed up for the course.

If you choose to help, thank you. If not, no problem."



"AN UNSOLVED MYSTERY" by Dr George McKay

He had now been at sea for almost two years. He was , to all intents and purposes, a fully fledged fisherman, fully capable of carrying out the full range of duties expected of him, but still to some extent a novice in the lore and experience needed to transform him into an experienced seaman. That would only come as a result of many years hard won knowledge, if at all. The ability to look out over the surface of the surrounding sea and to visualise not only a flat, lifeless plain but a living, moving, restless entity ruled by its own mysterious cycles, its currents, tides, depths and seasons. To some this ability was granted, to many it remained an impenetrable mystery. Whether he would ever join the favoured few was a secret for the future and one which he did not spend much time contemplating. Autumn had come and gone and already they were well into December. The annual migration of lemon soles, plaice, haddock and cod was well established and they could now look forward to enjoying a few weeks of good catches and high earnings before the shoals, slowly moving west along the edge of the Southern Trench, gradually declined and disappeared over the next six to eight weeks. Now they had established their early winter routine, sailing at midnight on Sunday night to fish in the still, frigid darkness of early winter, the strong, blustery winds of autumn stilled by the arrival of the winter frosts. Over the last few years his father, the skipper, had built up a well deserved reputation for exploiting to the full the lucrative shoals of soles and plaice as they passed on their mysterious, unseen migration route. This was based on working a specific area of ground, some ten or fifteen miles from home and, unusual for the seine net, mainly in the dark. Here they would spend most of their nights through December if the weather was reasonably kind before fishing the deeper water on the edge of the Trench for the few short hours of winter daylight. In this venture of night fishing they were left almost in solitary possession except for one other, older boat from their home port. Over the years a rivalry, sometimes friendly, sometimes barbed, had grown up between the skippers and their crews. This could wax and wane, dictated mainly by the relative degree of success of their efforts but always in a spirit of camaraderie and mutual respect

On this particular Monday morning they had lost the race for first haul on the grounds which had been rested over the weekend and their rival, the Replenish, was there before them. There ahead of them as they passed the looming bulk of Troup Head, black against the brighter, starlit night sky, was the dim working lights of their rival. At this time in the early nineteen sixties equipment and lighting were minimal. Far in the future lay the days of fluorescent lit decks, close circuit T.V., to monitor the working decks, satellite controlled navigational positioning and a wheel house resembling the flight deck of a Jumbo jet. Indeed it was only in the past year that their rival had installed a radio transmitter. Whether their rival being ahead of them made any major difference or not was debatable in terms of catch at the end of the day but it certainly resulted in being forced into second position for choice of areas to work for the rest of the night and, let it be whispered, a loss of face. The working day passed, its success or failure now buried deep in the mists of time and finally it was time to go home. Westward they sailed towards their home port to land their catch, wearily drag themselves home at the end of a sixteen hour day, wash, tidy up, eat and drop thankfully in to bed before starting all over again the next morning.


On getting up the next morning he thought his father was rather withdrawn

STRONSAY BIRD REPORT

Three species of American wader have been seen during the last month, including the amazing sight of two together - Semi-palmated Sandpiper and Long-billed Dowitcher - by the Matpow Loch on 18th September, and a Baird's Sandpiper on the beach off the Reserve on 23rd. Frustratingly all three birds were only present for a short time.

Autumn migration is now upon us with many migrants visiting the island gardens. These have included Blackcaps, Goldcrests, Robins, Chaffinches and in the last few days many Redwings and Song Thrushes - none of which breed on Stronsay. 2 Ring Ouzels have been seen and a flock of 15 Siskins posed perfectly for the evening class on 26th Sept, thanks to careful manoeuvring of the mini-bus by Sheila Williamson.

Seven or eight Yellow-browed Warblers have been seen in the first half of October - most in areas of tall weeds. These tiny migrants from Asia can be infuriatingly difficult to relocate, unlike the rather similar but much commoner Goldcrest. Two other very rare species of Asian warbler have been recorded in October - first a Dusky Warbler at Sunnybank on 4th followed by a Radde's Warbler in the Lower Millfield garden on Friday 13th - the same date as the first island record back in 1988!

Long-tailed Ducks have begun to arrive back in Mill Bay for the winter and the recently released Pheasants have bred successfully, with birds recorded from many areas. A few Snow Buntings have been seen - a species well worth looking for just above the shoreline.

Many Red Admirals have been seen in the last few days and there have been several sightings of Humming-bird Hawk Moth in the Sunnybank/Dale/Comelybank area in midmonth (perhaps the same individual?). Margaret Crowe reported a bat flying around Scoulters on 12th October.

H2Orkney Conference Report From September 7th

The day started with a great number of people arriving on the ferry from all over Europe. The people from Eday arriving by private charter. On arriving at the community centre everyone realised that Tony Marmont had already landed with his helicopter on the playing field.

83 people in total attended the event ranging from school children to OAPs. Various agencies from across Orkney were also well represented. The day started with local LDO William Caithness welcoming everyone and then handing over to A Carmichael to officially open the conference and chair the first two presentations. The first speaker Tom Stevenson an Orcadian set the scene and was met with some testing questions from the audience there was then a short interval for tea and coffee resuming with Maria Hidur Maack explaining what Iceland have done and would like to do, her presentation was a mixture of very serious and some more light hearted material. We then broke for lunch, which I think I speak on behalf of everyone present was absolutely breathtaking and for this we must sincerely thank the Stronsay Hotel.

The afternoon session then resumed with Prof Tony Marmont from Beacon Energy describing how he has incorporated hydrogen technology in and around his home then Dave McGrath from siGEN who had provided the hydrogen BBQ the fuel cell and the ghost car raised some issues regarding funding packages. Dave then made a hasty retreat outside to start cooking the sausages and burgers provided by M A Williamson, on the BBQ this is the first hydrogen BBQ in the UK quite amazing to think it actually happened on Stronsay. At this point there were also some tours of the Island, to the Rothiesholm sand and the Vat o Kirbuster with everyone who went returning revived by the Stronsay air.

There was then a small change to the program with a show of some slides of the 'Utsira' project in Norway shown by Iain Russell from Norsk Hydro. Through out the day the message from all of the speakers was 'just go and do it' at this point we then had the man who has 'just gone and done it' Sandy Macaulay from the PURE project in Unst his talk to round off the day was very entertaining and even included a short video clip of his band in Shetland performing powered completely by hydrogen, he then stated that they had appeared in 'Time' magazine I think it must have been because of the hydrogen power!!(I will leave it up to the individual to judge the musical prowess)


Through out the day the Orkney Amateur Radio Club had been operating a radio station powered by the hydrogen fuel cell, they operated for a staggering 31 hours non stop managing to make 1806 contacts with 65 different countries the furthest being New Zealand at 10, 960 miles away well and truly putting Stronsay on the map.

Mike Erdman chair of the trust thanked everyone for their help, sponsorship etc and he reinforced the issue 'just go and do it'. The evening was then rounded off with some lively music from the Stronsay band with various visitors joining in at different times on various instruments.

ASTRONOTES by D.Proudman

Merry Dancers and Shooting Stars

Well past the equinox nights are much darker and on clear nights the sky is spectacular and on Stronsay we are very lucky to have relatively little light pollution. Most people in Britain can not see what we can. Computer users can find a light map of Britain from space at:

www.dark-skies.org

The Merry Dancers or Aurora Borealis or Northern Lights are often seen as a glow in the north. Electrically charged particles from the Sun are deflected by the Earth's magnetic field towards the poles and as they enter the upper atmosphere the interaction produces light rather like a fluorescent lamp. When there is increased activity on the Sun the energy and number of particles ejected increases and if they reach Earth the display can fill the sky with searchlight beams, dancing curtains and bomb bursts, often coloured. The Aurorae have maxima and minima over about 11 years. The last minimum has passed so we can look forward to increased intensity and frequency for several years.

Shooting Stars or meteors are bright trails of light generated when small particles, about sand grain size, enter the upper atmosphere at great speed and are vaporised. Sporadic meteors can be seen at any time and are unpredictable but there are meteor showers which are predictable. They result from clouds of debris left behind by comets orbiting the Sun which Earth passes through at the same time each year on its journey round the Sun. Each shower seems to radiate from a point in the constellation of stars in the Earth's direction of travel. The shower is named after the constellation and the point is the radiant. It is the same effect as driving into snowfall when the flakes seem to rush at and past you from a distant point in front.

Meteor Showers

October 7 -Full Moon

October 21, 22 -Orionids Meteor Shower. The Orionids is an average shower producing about 20 meteors per hour at their peak. The shower will peak on the 21st, but some meteors can be seen from October 15-29. This is a great year for the Orionids. The new moon means the darkest possible sky. Those in dark locations will be able to see even the faintest meteors. Best viewing will be to the east after midnight.

October 22 -New Moon

November 5 -Full Moon

November 17 -Leonid Meteor Shower. The Leonids is one of the better meteor showers to observe, producing an average of 40 meteors per hour at their peak. The shower itself has a cyclic peak year every 33 years where hundreds of meteors can be seen each hour. The last spectacular showers occurred in 2001. The shower peaks this year on November 17, but you can see some meteors from November 13 - 20. The nearly-new moon should not be a problem this year for the Leonids. Even the faintest meteors should be visible this year. Look for the shower radiating from the constellation Leo after midnight.

December 5 -Full Moon

December 14 -Geminids Meteor Shower. Considered by many to be the best meteor shower in the heavens, the Geminids are known for producing up to 60 multicoloured meteors per hour at their peak. The peak night this year is December 14. Some meteors should be visible from December 6-19. The first quarter moon should set shortly after midnight, leaving a dark sky for observing even the faintest meteors. The radiant point for this shower will be in the constellation of Gemini. Best viewing is usually to the east after midnight.
