HARVEST HOME NOVEMBER 2006

Stronsay held it's Harvest Home on Saturday 11th November it began at 8pm. Ian Cooper opened the proceedings by welcoming everybody there explaining that unfortunately the Ferry had been cancelled dut to the poor weather and some could not make it He then asked Mike Erdman to say grace. A wonderful meal was then enjoyed by everyone. With all replete with food. Ian gave the yearly farming report. He said every one thought the winter would never come to an end and everything was eventually planted late. Even the beasts were not calling to go out as in previous years. However when the sun came out it was all systems go and despite a late start things soon caught up.

The harvest was plentiful. Ian remarked that when the cows went out to the fields he had never known so little grass and when they came in for the winter he had never known so much grass in the fields.

Jim Cooper was the guest speaker for the night and was recounting farming in Orkney. Up until the late 1700's Orkney was a grain growing area with only a few cattle for milk. By 1798 there was still only 1200 cattle. It would therefore follow that half of Orkney's farms would not have had cattle. The grain grown at this time was bere and black oats. Bere was a very old type of four rowed barley. There is evidence to show that it has been grown in Orkney for 5,000 years and was still grown in Stronsay in the 1960's, a little is still grown in Birsay and made into meal at the 'Board House Mill'. Bere bannocks are still popular with some folk. There was no fertiliser, dung or slurry, only sea weed. The rotation was 6 years bere with lots of seaweed followed by 1 year black oats with no seaweed. Areas of natural grass or heather land were never cultivated. There was no grass seed available grain was also the main food for everybody with the occasional caithe or mutton to supplement this, limpets and winkles were also popular at mealtimes. The islands on the east side of Orkney were renowned for the quality of their grain. It was in great demand as malt or seed, while the islands to the west produced mainly feeding quality it was not by chance that Earl Rognvald went to Papa Stronsay to get malt for brewing his yule feast, as it was the best grain available, it was however unfortunate that his rival Earl Thorfinn should arrive and murder Rognvald soon after. Many years earlier geese were kept at every farm as goose feathers and quills were in great demand. In some areas of Stronsay were the land has not been cultivated too often, it is still possible to see the site of many goosie gouys where the geese were shut in at night. Michael Cooper thanked Jim for his talk and for the fantastic food that had been prepared and served. It was then time to move through for the dance with the Rothiesholm Rascals & Co.&

Mike Holland was the MC. Everyone was wished a safe journey home and the hall emptied quickly.

This was a game in which the children galloped their ponies from post to post, jumping off to put on some strange clothes, jumping back on again until they reached the next post, and so on. The game was only over when someone galloped their pony past the winning post, wearing all the clothes that had been laid out. Poor Pete had found this game particularly hard, as the boy who was riding him was quite heavy, and kept landing on his back with an awful thump.

Part two

"AN UNSOLVED MYSTERY" by Dr George McKay

This, indeed, was shocking news. Even at this early stage in his fishing career he had already been close to tragedy and sudden death at sea. Only the previous winter one of the fleet, working one of the inshore grounds close by had three of its four man crew swept overboard when the warp roller was wrenched from its mounting on the boats rail, allowing the towing warps to sweep forward and throw three of the crew into the sea . Only one was recovered alive. Major disaster although this undoubtedly was for the small close knit community it was still understandable as the type of accident met with from time to time in the fishing industry. This sudden death of a colleague on his way home from work, after any danger should have been over for the day, seemed somehow even more upsetting, the fickle finger of fate in its cold, compassionless selection. Again they sailed that morning, now however the edge had been blunted, the thrill of the hunt subdued by the sudden loss of a colleague, the change in their orderly routine brutally thrust upon them. He wondered what would happen now to his pal who had recently started as a deckhand on the Replenish, proud to have joined the crew of one of the top boats. The rest of the week passed miserably until Friday when no boats sailed as a mark of respect. Instead, in the early afternoon of a cold grey December day the entire fishing community followed the funeral cortege to the local cemetry, tucked behind a low hill, safely out of sight of the sea, to bid farewell to their colleague. Then back into town to pick up the strands of their everyday life.

Things must have moved quickly from then on. The sons of the skipper of the Replenish, like so many of the Macduff fishing families had not followed in their fathers footsteps. With no one to take over the boat she was advertised for sale and within the next few days a prospective buyer was found. The boat was hauled up on the slipway for survey and there she remained for a few days. In the meantime the weather had deteriorated, the wind swinging into the south east bringing wet snow to add to the general winter misery. At this time electronic navigation aids had still not become standard equipment in the small inshore fleet. This meant that the reduced visibility during blizzard conditions made it impossible to pick up their land marks making fishing difficult, if not impossible. Whether this was the reason for him being at the harbour during daylight hours or not it is now impossible to say. However, he certainly was on the day the Replenish came off the slipway following her survey. He can still remember the definite sense of disquiet he felt watching her come off the cradle and being pulled into her berth, ghostly in the swirling snowflakes, one side of the boat and her wheelhouse covered in the wet, white snow, almost other worldly, faintly menacing. The sale had been completed and the new owners, two young brothers from Shetland, were there ready to take her to her new home port. Despite poor weather condition, although by no means really bad, they decided to sail immediately to reach home before Hogmanay. The following day she left Macduff bound for Shetland and disappeared from the face of the earth forever. Despite searches along her route and along the shores of the various coasts no trace was ever found, no wreckage, no bodies. As in so many tales like this there is often a sequel sometimes years later. Some forty years later when he was working on the Orkney island of Stronsay he happened to mention this to a friend he was visiting one evening.

"You know", said Bill "its strange you should mention that. I remember that well. We had been out celebrating Hogmanay and got back home around nine in the morning when a call came through from the coastguard's to go and check the beaches for wreckage. We had something to eat and spent the rest of the day walking the shoreline but found pothing"

It was strange how this conversation brought back memories of the tragedy still quite fresh in his mind and presumably more so to the grieving relatives left behind, never to know what happened to their loved ones, no memorial, no known last resting place, something summed up so well in the ballad Lord Yester- a young nobleman who presumably perished on the battle field at Flodden but whose body was never recovered after the battle. To give some comfort to the grieving relatives legend had it that they had gone off to some distant land, there to carry on the good work. "Maybe he's gone with James and John To fish by Galilee.


STRONSAY BIRD REPORT John & Sue Holloway

If you havn't seen a Pheasant yet this year consider yourself unlucky! Birds have been seen as far apart as Oddie and Briarlea with small parties in several places near the centre of the island. All originate from the recently introduced birds.

Most of the autumn migrants have now moved on but a few Blackcaps and Chiffchaffs still remain around the gardens. Ring Ouzels have been seen at Oddie, Mt. Pleasant and Southbank and a Snow Bunting was seen below one of the aerogenerators on Rothiesholm by Eoin Stevenson. Several Snow Buntings are present now and may be seen along the shoreline or in stubble fields throughout the winter. A few Little Auks have been seen flying past Bomasty Bay, with one seen by visitors Mike and Lynn Johnson on the Matpow Loch. A Storm Petrel discovered on board by Jennifer George and John Stevenson during the trip to Eday on Sunday 5th Nov, was released successfully in Mill Bay next morning - the same day as Norman and Kath Kent saw a Black Redstart at Dale. The most unexpected bird of the period has been a Black-eared Wheatear along the track to the Bu sands but once again this major rarity was only present for a short time.

We shall soon be compiling the annual Bird Report so now is the time to send in any records you may have and if anyone is looking for a different Christmas Gift for that awkward relative or friend, copies of our recent book 'Stronsay's Garden Birds' can be purchased direct from ourselves, the Post Office and Fish Mart at £20 (retails at £28).

CHOCOLATE SYRUP LAYER PUDDING

Dissolve ½ pt water & 2oz sugar, cool add 2 tablespoons rum.

Melt 8oz chocolate (not cooking choc), cool Lightly whip ½ pt double cream, fold into chocolate.

Line a loaf tin with cling film.

Qip sponge fingers into rum mixture & place

in bottom of the tin. Cover with half chocolate mixture. Add more sponge fingers then cover with rest of chocolate mixture. Finish off with a layer of sponge fingers.

Cover with cling film & refrigerate over-

Cover with cling film & refrigerate overnight. Turn out onto a plate decorate as desired. Great served sliced with strawberries or raspberries.

Nana's Snippets from the Past

The Stronsay Coal Hulks

Many stories have been written about ships and boats connected with Stronsay but so far no one has mentioned the 'Coal Hulks'. They were the ones that lay anchored loaded with coal to supply the drifters when the Herring Fishing was at its height in Stronsay. There were usually four or five of them, the old cement barge now lying across the entrance to the Oyce of Huip being one. The others were :- 'Watchful' which belonged to J Sutherland, coal merchant Stronness, 'Hebe' belonging to D. Chalmers, coal merchant Stronsay, 'Glenmore' belonging to Duncan and Jamieson a firm from south, 'Dorjoy' belonging to Duncan McIver Of Stornaway and 'The Riga' belonging to Leslie an Aberdeen firm. The hulks were usually manned by Orcadians but the 'Dorjoy' had men from the North of Scotland or the Hebrides, coalers came from south with the coal for them.

My uncle, the late James Moodie, was one of the workers on the 'Hebe' and he used to tell us about the capers worked on board, such as looking in a hurry for your boots and finding them nailed to the deck! No doubt the fun times made up for the monotony of working a shovel all day as they had to fill the tubs with coal which were then swung out from the hulk and tipped into the hold of the drifter.

I suppose many people sailing into Stronsay on the first 'Earl Sigurd' and 'Earl Thorfinn' and now the ferries of the same name will have wondered why the cement barge was still lying there. She drifted from her moorings and was holed on a rock causing her to sink to the seabed. As there was still coal left in the hold many a good fire was enjoyed in Stronsay with the help of 'The Shifty Pole' which was used to grapple the coal, this caused the then coal merchant a few grey hairs.

As the second world war marked the end of the herring fishing in Stronsay, the old hulks were bought by D. Chalmers (Norton) broken up locally and later sold. The wood was still in good condition so there may still be a few corner posts around that started as part of a ship. The lintels in the farlings on Coopers beach (now



belong to Norton) came out of old hulks from many years back and can be seen as you walk down past the council houses. (Whitehall Village) I am grateful to the late Mr George Burghes (Dod) for his help in remembering the names of the Hulks and to Ian Cooper for taking the photo.


