VACCINE CLINIC FOR PETS ON STRONSAY

My motivation for setting this up is purely as a service for islanders, it seems a shame for pets to travel to mainland when I am on the island. I am also happy to treat anything that needs attention when I can. Unfortunately for the farming community it is many years since I did farm work so I can't really help them much.

We will be in residence on Stronsay for around 20 weeks each year, outside of these times folks will have to travel away or meet the vets on the pier.

It's probably best that calls to me are routed through NorthVet where possible, but I'm happy for anyone to track me down on the island with urgent requests either at home, phone 07595119532, or in the white van with the green roof!

North Isles Natural Wellbeing Project – Autumn update

Coming into the winter months the outdoor activities are slowing down, bringing nature indoors through art events and back to planning for next year. The project is research based, gaining input from communities about their wellbeing and using nature to support this. The project is now rolling out across the North Isles, gathering community based research and connecting the networks and support links.

Here on Stronsay, I am developing some of the subgroups that folk were keen on after CitSci Fest. There is lots going on behind the scenes, gathering information and resources ready to get out in spring. In the meantime, we are planning a year of wildlife recording, working with North Isles Landscape Partnership Scheme. More details will follow, and it is so easy to be part of this collaborative community project.

We will also be looking for focus groups over winter who would be happy to take part in short telephone interviews or Zoom call as part of the research. More information will be published about how to be involved.

The paper making kit is now available to borrow with full instructions. If you missed Lin Chau's Orkney International Science Festival workshop at the greenhouse, or if you loved it so much that you want to get making recycled Christmas Cards, please get in touch to borrow it. If there is interest in a Christmas card making workshop using the materials, please let me know and I can facilitate this.

Don't forget our printmaking workshops in November with Orkney Art Club. The morning sessions are booked up but there are still spaces in the afternoon.

North Isles rollout

Stronsay CitSci Fest launched in September as a pilot scheme to engage community members in activities thtat promote leaarning new sills, connecting with others and giving back. The community response was brilliant with events covering marine biology, seaweed surveying, beach litter surveying, wildlife recording and astronomy. Participants learned about current national and local research projects that they can be involved with, collaboaring with MCS, RSPB, National Shark Trust and how to contribute data that they would discover from being out on a walk. We are now opening up sub groups to continue this interest and allow community groups to be self sufficient, planning and conducting their own activities. A guide and resources is being produced to allow activities to be easily replicated across the isles.

Equipment Hire

The project has purchased a range of waterproof clothing to remove the barriers to community members taking part in activities. Waterproof trousers, jackets and wellies, in all sizes from toddler to adult are available to borrow from Stronsay Development Trust. More equipment is being purchased to support wildlife recording projects and enjoying time in nature, including binoculars and guide books.

RECENT BIRD SIGHTINGS

The lack of numbers of visiting species during the previous four weeks was made up for by the quality of a handful of sightings in October - including a party of Snow Buntings along the shoreline in St Catherine's Bay on 7th, followed by a brilliant 'Arctic' Redpoll found by Butch and Flo in their garden in Whitehall Village (see illustration I did of a similar bird during the big influx of the species into Great Britain in late Autumn 1995.).

Several birds of prey have been recorded this month -2-3 Hen Harriers, 2-3 Sparrowhawks, single Merlin, single Kestrel and best of all a Rough-legged Buzzard in the Rothiesholm area seen on three separate occasions (JH, DO, G&BW). There have also been notable influxes of thrushes from the continent and Iceland - mainly Redwings and Blackbirds, with less Fieldfares and just a few Song Thrushes. Goldcrests and Blackcaps were the most numerous of the small species.

A Dabchick was seen on the Matpow Loch on 20th and two Long-tailed Ducks were on the Bu Loch the same day. Another big influx occurred on 22nd when visitors George and Betty Winslow found several species at Airy, including 2 Black Redstarts, 2 Black-caps, 2 –3 Goldcrests and a Lesser Whitethroat – and better was to come the following day - a moulting male Bluethroat in the road between Islesview and Airy Cottage. The same small area around Islesview struck again the following day with a Redpoll feeding in the road and a tired-looking Waxwing preening among the dockans (see photo). A short distance away a Long-eared Owl was seen, roosting in the Airy garden (G&BW).

A Goldfinch was seen by GW at Holland Farm on 25th when a party of 12 Long-tailed Ducks (all males) drifted past us along the shoreline at Castle, and many birds departed that day. But there were still more surprises before the end of the month – a Haw-finch at the feeders on several occasions in the Mount Pleasant garden (Liz and Jean Stevenson); a flock of over 50 Skylarks between Dale and Samsonslane (DO); the Roughlegged Buzzard in Rothiesholm, a Woodcock in the Castle garden on 29th, and a Jack Snipe by the roadside at Fingeo on 30th(JH - see photo.) There have been very few sightings of Chaffinches and Bramblings this autumn – so far!

Almost a return to normality in the pastureland this winter – very few geese - and as a result, good numbers of the traditional wintering waders have arrived, including one massive flock of at least 600 Golden Plover in the Banks area.

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

A report from your councillor at a time of great uncertainty for our nation.

Clearly, I spoke too soon in my last Letter, quoting those words of Alexander Pope (1688-1744), "For sense survived, when merry jests were past". Far from sense surviving, lunacy and chaos have been thriving. Recent events certainly make one reassess the actions of the earlier of our King's namesakes, when he ruled without Parliament for eleven years !



Recent highlights for me have been civic and ceremonial duties. I had the pleasure of presenting a centenarian with a basket of flowers from OIC (photograph above), and I've participated in two Orkney College graduation ceremonies (photograph below). The additional ceremony was held for those graduands who missed out on having their degrees conferred in 2020 and 2021 owing to the pandemic restrictions. The ceremony has developed over the years I have been involved in it. It now begins with the piping-in of the University mace and a procession of academics and dignitaries around the cathedral. The next development I would like to see is for the audience to round things off by heartily singing Gaudeamus Igitur accompanied by the cathedral organ, and I've placed this idea before the Orkney College Management Council for its consideration.

Less grand events I have attended this month include: a North Isles ward catch-up; Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board pre-meeting and meeting; a General Meeting of the full council; a seminar on our Learning Estate Strategy; a special meeting of the Education, Leisure & Housing Committee; a seminar on the cost-of-living crisis; Orkney College Management Council meetings; and a Special General Meeting. I went to Stronsay to attend the meeting of their community council, and I am looking forward to regularly getting out to the Isles in person, just like I used to pre-pandemic.

Lately, I have endorsed applications from a couple of community groups for grant funding from charitable organisations. Where groups are needing this sort of support, I am happy to help.

Because Orkney is dependent solely on a single provider for its air services (both internal and external) I have had this added to our Corporate Risk Register. This was very timely, given that Loganair has now announced that it is up for sale.

You may remember my saying, in Issue 103 (August 2021), that when I ordered an NHS Covid-19 test kit online, I'd discovered, to my surprise, that I live in "School Road". I now know that this comes from something called the Corporate Address Gazetteer (CAG). Where there is no existing road name in the CAG, it seems that somebody is making them up! In other words, re-writing our history. I would, therefore, be interested in hearing from the longer-term residents of our islands, if they know of any traditional names of roads that are unmarked, or that have been incorrectly re-named by the CAG. As for choosing names for un-named roads, I really think the local communities and local historians should be involved.

There are various channels through which members of the public can make comments, compliments or complaints to OIC. You can visit your island link officer (if you have one), telephone 01856-873535, e-mail complaints@orkney.gov.uk , do it online at https://orkney-self.achieveservice.com/MyServices.or write a letter to OIC, School Place, Kirkwall KW15 1NY. Your comment/compliment/complaint will then be passed to the most relevant department and logged to ensure a timely response. Should you fail to get satisfaction by this route, then your councillor will be ready to investigate.

Records of a Bygone Age Stronsay's Royal Visit - 12th August 1960

The end of an era. That's a well-used term, too often used lightly, but it can surely never be used more appropriately than with the death of our Queen on 8th September 2022.

Royalist or republican, few would deny the impact she has had on this country for more than 70 years as she fulfilled the promise made to the nation on her 21st birthday when, in a broadcast to the nation on 21st April 1947, she made the pledge:

"I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."

Well, she certainly had a long life and who can argue that she failed to keep that promise? She surely had a lifetime of service, with her last official engagement taking place just two days before she died at the age of 96. This, remember, at an age where any woman of that time with a 'normal' job would have been expecting to have been retired for 36 years!

I, along with about 55 million other British citizens, have known no one other than Queen Elizabeth II as the sovereign of our country and have never witnessed a coronation but, along with probably the majority of those 55 million, we have seen the Queen 'live' at some time in our lives as she went about her royal duties.

We were fortunate to have a Royal visit to Stronsay in 1960 when the Queen and Prince Philip visited our island briefly on a Royal tour of Orkney and Shetland and, although I have only a very vague memory of the occasion, I would like to record a little of what ~I've heard about it here.

The Royal tour was originally planned for August 1959 but, as Queen Elizabeth was expecting at the time and not enjoying the best of health, the visit had to be post-poned at quite short notice. Prince Andrew arrived safely in February 1960 and, soon after, the Royal visit was rescheduled for August of that year.

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Doris Shearer recalls a fact finding visit to Stronsay by the Queen's Private Secretary and a few other officials some time before the Royal visit was to take place. She was working at the Stronsay Hotel at the time and the first indication they had of this visit was when a helicopter landed on Grice Ness, out at the back of Whitehall Village. She was helping David and Betty MacRae, the owners of the hotel at the time, with some spring-cleaning and they had all the chairs out of the dining room, with the seats out of the chairs giving them a good clean when the passengers on the helicopter - the Queen's Private Secretary and his entourage - arrived for afternoon tea. This was supposed to have been pre-booked but, due to a breakdown in communication somewhere along the line, the booking had never been made! Nothing daunted, chairs were soon replaced, a quick trip was made to the nearby shop for supplies and the party were very soon catered for. The helicopter created great interest, particularly among some of the young boys from the area who had never seen a helicopter before, and a good crowd gathered to see these visitors depart in their helicopter.

A small souvenir programme giving details and the itinerary of the proposed visit had already been printed in 1959, ready for sale to the public at the places to be visited. It's interesting to note that, in the days when the Council were possibly a little more frugal with their cash, this booklet was still used, although the date shown was 11th August 1959 and the visit was, in fact, 12th August 1960. This has certainly led to some confusion in the interim, with some citing the booklet as irrefutable evidence that the visit did actually take place in 1959!

After visiting Stromness and Kirkwall earlier that day, the Queen and Duke of Edinburgh boarded the Royal Yacht Britannia bound for Stronsay, arriving in the harbour just after 4 pm where the Britannia dropped anchor. The Queen, Prince Philip and their entourage boarded the Royal Barge and arrived at Stronsay Pier a few minutes later where she was escorted to a specially constructed marquee at the side of the pier. Here a number of local dignitaries, along with a few visitors, were presented to the Queen by Orkney's Lord Lieutenant Colonel Robert Scarth O.B.E.

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These were: William Work of Holland, Stronsay's County Councillor at the time, along with Mrs Work; Robert Stevenson of the Bu, chair of Stronsay District Council and Mrs Stevenson; George Muir, Chair of Sanday District Council; John Allan, Chair of Eday District Council and Mrs Allan; David Chalmers and Mrs Chalmers; Stronsay Minister Rev EPG Fox and Mrs Fox; Hon Secretary of the Stronsay Lifeboat Captain Edward Clement D.S.C. and Mrs Clements, and Tom Carter, Stronsay Harbourmaster and ex coxswain of the Stronsay Lifeboat.

At the presentation Captain Clements, who had seen active service in the First World War and was King's Harbourmaster at Kirkwall during the Second, was proudly wearing his seven medals and his wife Josephine, who had been a Wren officer, was also wearing her two. On seeing these medals the Queen, who had herself joined the A.T.S. (Auxiliary Territorial Service) as a mechanic the day she turned 18, smiled and said "I see you have them all up!" The Duke spoke with Captain Clements, asking about his military service, and, when told by the Captain that he was now retired, quipped "That's when most people seem to start to work!"

The Queen was then presented with a bouquet of pink carnations by eight year old Ruth Miller, daughter of one of the Lifeboat crew and granddaughter of the Chair of the District Council. As the Royal Party left the marquee, Prince Philip spoke to Ruth, saying "You must be absolutely frozen!"

A number of ex-service men and women from both World Wars were lined up at the top of the pier and, with the tour now much more informal, the Queen and Prince Philip stopped and spoke to a number of them as they made their way up the pier.

This visit by the Royals was certainly well received, with nearly all of the island population turning out to celebrate the visit. All the children on the island had previously been presented with a boxed commemorative butter knife and a Union Jack, with these flags being waved enthusiastically as the Queen walked past, making this a colourful and unforgettable event!

The Queen and Duke next visited the grocer and draper shop owned by John and Pat Dennison. John, as 2nd Coxswain of the Stronsay Lifeboat, was on duty at the pier so it was up to a very nervous Pat to show the Royals around the shop and to sell the Queen a packet of oatcakes for 11d and a packet of Orkney tablet (fudge) for 10d.

The Queen's shopping trip was remembered some 60 years later when, as part of the Stronsay celebrations to mark the Queen's Platinum Anniversary, one of the questions in a Royalty-based quiz asked how much 10d and 11d totalled in old money. Very few, even among the 'oldies', knew the correct answer which was 1/9d (about 9p in today's money!)

Returning down the pier, the Lord Lieutenant presented Jimmy Stout, the Coxswain of the Stronsay Lifeboat John Gellatly Hyndman, to the Royal couple. Jimmy Stout in turn introduced the crew of the Lifeboat to the Queen before inviting both her and the Duke aboard the lifeboat for a guided tour. This was the first time a reigning British monarch had set foot aboard a Lifeboat and both the Queen and Prince Philip showed an active interest in the boat and the equipment carried aboard.

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The The Royal party then continued down the pier to the accompaniment of local musicians playing some lively Scottish tunes on fiddle and accordion and, as they boarded the Royal Barge to leave, they were fittingly serenaded with that old Scottish favourite 'Will ye no come back again?'

The Outward Bound training schooner 'Prince Louis' was in Orkney at that time and, all decked out with flags to celebrate the Royal visit, had anchored in the Stronsay harbour earlier that day. As the Royal Barge passed by on its way out to the Britannia, the crew of young sailors were all lined up along their ship's rail, adding their cheers to help give the Royal party a rousing send off.

The lifeboat had followed the Royal Barge out of the harbour and lay off as the Royal Party boarded the Britannia, waiting until the Royal Yacht was underway for her next port of call at Westray before returning to her anchorage between the Stronsay piers. This signified the end of Stronsay's own 'Glorious Twelfth', an event that all fortunate enough to have witnessed felt honoured and privileged to have seen and participated in.

I'm hoping to put together an album of photos and folk's memories of the Royal visit to Stronsay to go on display in the Heritage Centre and I'm sure there will still be a few folk around with memories of Stronsay's Royal visit. I would be delighted to hear of those memories, or to see any photos anyone may have to add to the album! The NHS Orkney Isles Network of Care Manager has issued the following statement to the outer isles Community Councils for local circulation:

Due to the number of postal strikes between the 13th October 2022 - 2nd December 2022, and to enable the continuation of an effective repeat prescription service to the population of the Isles, NHS Orkney would appreciate your assistance.

During the above period, NHS Orkney will be transporting prescriptions via the Inter Island Flight Service, Hauliers and Ferries on a Monday, Wednesday, and Friday of each week, and not daily via the Postal Service, to ensure there are no delays in the delivery of patient medication. It would be greatly appreciated if, patients requiring repeat prescriptions, order these in a timely manner so that their supply of medication is not compromised. 

Hello again everyone.

In the August Limpet, I mentioned some thoughts on prayer and how a group had found sharing together our concerns in prayer to be helpful.

Prayer is a chance to be still and let out or orientate our inner thoughts to the spiritual, to the divine; a way of pausing, reflecting, seeking inspiration, strength and spiritual guidance to act rightly. Today I want to share two further different experiences of prayer I have recently mentioned in our church, that I hope exemplify this.

One is a man I know whose wife died and he was really struggling and stuck like a recluse avoiding everyone. He was no churchgoer, but had somehow wanted a church funeral for his wife, which partly encouraged him. Later an accident left him in A& E, and an unknown woman who was a hospital cleaner, asked him if he believed in God, and would he like her to pray with him- surprisingly, he said yes to both questions. The prayer said was powerfully therapeutic in helping him for the first time let out his inner feelings of bereavement, in tears, and in giving him a unique religious experience that lifted him up to be able to move forward step by step, from the emotional paralysis he had felt. Secondly, in church today with clocks changing and Halloween, we thought about how prayer can help us restrain our fears and worries, and also guide us to refocus, especially in giving us fresh purpose to help others. We read an extract from the book, "standing in the need of prayer", by Coretta Scott King, the widow of Rev Dr Martin Luther king Jr who tells of how prayer gave him the strength and direction for leading the civil rights movement. She says:

For my husband, prayer was a daily source of courage and strength that gave him the ability to carry on in even the darkest hours of our struggle. I remember one very difficult day when he came home bone-weary from the stress that came with his leadership of the Montgomery Bus Boycott. In the middle of that night, he was awakened by a threatening and abusive phone call, one of many we received throughout the movement. On this particular occasion, however, Martin had had enough. After the call, he got up from bed and made himself some coffee. He began to worry about his family, and all of the burdens that came with our movement weighed heavily on his soul. With his head in his hands, Martin bowed over the kitchen table and prayed aloud to God: "Lord, I am taking a stand for what I believe is right. The people are looking to me for leadership, and if I stand before them without strength and courage, they will falter. I am at the end of my powers. I have nothing left. I have nothing left. I have come to the point where I can't face it alone.

Later he told me, "At that moment, I experienced the presence of the Divine as I had never experienced Him before. It seemed as though I could hear a voice saying: 'Stand up for righteousness; stand up for truth; and God will be at our side forever.'" When Martin stood up from the table, he was imbued with a new sense of confidence, and he was ready to face anything.

I believe that this prayer was a critical turning point for the African-American freedom struggle, because from that point forward, we had a leader who was divinely inspired and could not be turned back by threats or any form of violence. This kind of courage and conviction is truly contagious, and I know his example inspired me to carry on through the difficult days of my journey.

She goes on to tell how 3 days later their house was bombed by their opponents. She prayed and no one was harmed. As importantly, she felt an inner calm that God was with them, and took away their anger towards the perpetrators. "Martin's speech that day was yet another crucial turning point for our freedom struggle because it set the tone of nonviolence that gave our movement its unique credibility and enabled all of the victories we achieved under his leadership.

Prayer was a wellspring of strength and inspiration during the Civil Rights Movement. Throughout the movement, we prayed for greater human understanding. We prayed for the safety of our compatriots in the freedom struggle. We prayed for victory in our nonviolent protests, for brotherhood and sisterhood among people of all races, for reconciliation and the fulfilment of the Beloved Community.

May God bless you in your prayers with strength to get through whatever you face and help you rise up for goodness
