




Stronsay Heritage Centre

SDT is working with the Stronsay Heritage Society and we have secured the services of consultant Davie Campbell to support us through the feasibility stage towards a new Heritage Centre.

The first step in this next phase of work was a drop in community consultation held at the Hotel on 15th July when folk received an update and discussed the project. This included updates on the Mission Hall site, the heritage trail, the need to consider a new site for the centre, and exploring ideas for what the Heritage Centre could include: due to recent OIC Planning and SEPA reports, we now need to rethink where we will locate the new Heritage Centre and how the Mission Hall could still be used by the community. One piece of land has been identified and favoured and other sites were identified and discussed at length along with ideas for other needs of the island so the new site could become a community hub.



It's the time of the Paris Olympics, and already there have been some great achievements, and some disasters, yet even amidst failure some have shown a wonderful spirit that can inspire us and maybe help us cope- we may not get to be an athlete but we can find something of their spirit to keep going.

Different athletes have different ways to find strength or inner calm for the right moment. Adam Peaty is one who showed great calm after his big swimming event despite only missing gold by a fingernail, which would have made him an all-time great. He is someone who says his Christian faith gives him the mental strength and calm to cope and helped him recover from a period of mental despair, especially through finding acceptance and love, but also through prayer. And its something we can find also.



The Paris Olympics also marks the 100th anniversary of the great Scottish Olympic champion [and Scottish rugby internationalist] Eric Liddell, who was immortalised in the film Chariots of Fire.

Eric won gold at the 1924 Paris Olympics but not at his chosen race. He was a committed Christian and refused to run on a Sunday (the Christian Sabbath), with the consequence that he was forced to withdraw from the 100 metres

race, his best event, and switch belatedly to run in the 400 metres in which he was not expected to win. He not only won the race, but broke the existing world record.



He later became a missionary in China, and during WW2 was captured and imprisoned in a Japanese prison of war camp for a long period. It was harsh but Eric's spirit helped others get through.

A fellow prisoner recorded "Looking back, one can realise how very much we all owed to Eric's unconquerable spirit. We were often dismayed and sometimes daunted, but Eric's

calm confidence, his readiness to undertake any responsibility or distasteful work, and his utter fearlessness, based on a simple but all-pervading faith in God, who had called him to the work, were our mainstay and sheet anchor in time of trouble. They will remember him in China for his ready smile, his warm friendliness and sincerity, and for the vital faith which made him untiring and fearless, and which inspired Chinese and foreign alike with renewed strength and confidence" Incidentally in prison, he broke his own sabbath rule, to help children run and play on Sundays, as his overriding priority was to love God and his neighbours.



A fellow prisoner described Eric's secret power: "Every morning about 6 am with curtains tightly drawn, to keep in the shining of our peanut-oil lamp, lest the prowling sentries should think someone was trying to escape, he used to climb out of his top bunk, past sleeping dormitory mates. Then, he and another would read, pray, think about the day's duties, and note what should be done. Eric was a man

of prayer not only at set times....he talked to God all the time, naturally: his life was grounded in God, in faith and trust."

You might easily say well its all right for him he was a strong man- its not so easy for the rest of us. And yet a colleague of Eric's in China, said of him that he was "the most remarkable example in my experience of a man of average ability and talents developing those talents to an amazing degree ..through the power of the Holy Spirit." Liddel's faith was not miraculous, but based on a lifetime of disciplined prayer and bible study, and ordinary faithful service to his neighbours, which inspired those around him. So perhaps we can all hope to be a little more Liddell-like? And find something of his strength and spirit to keep going when its hard- open to helping others and finding strength , and spirit by taking time to let God into our lives?

My time here formally finishes on 6th October, but I will be away for times before then. If I can help anyone in any way before I go, please do ask. I do not have the ability of Eric Liddell, but I can share with you what I can of his faithful service and inspiration.

SSEN - £3m Community Fund

Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks (SSEN), the Distribution Network Operator for central southern England and the north of Scotland, is now welcoming applications to its new Powering Communities to Net Zero fund.

The new Powering Communities to Net Zero (PCNZ) fund is a successor to the previous Resilient Communities Fund, which has awarded over £5m to around 700 projects in the past nine years. The new fund will run annually from now, concluding in Spring 2028. More than £3m in grants will be awarded during this time. This fund will support communities during prolonged power interruptions caused by storms, aid their ability to cope in periods of severe weather, and will now also support the adoption of new low-carbon technologies by non-profit organisations.

The new fund explained:

The fund is split into two categories; community-led physical and environmental resilience, and Low Carbon Technology (LCTs).

The new community-led physical and environmental resilience grants.

Half of the £3m funding will be available over the next four years to enable communities to apply for grants that will bolster physical and environmental resilience measures. Further details of the criteria are found in the fund guidance and in the application form. Grants of up to £15,000 will be awarded to successful applicants in this category.

The new low-carbon technology grants.

The other half of the funding being made available over the next four years will also be available for non-profit organisations to apply for grants to go towards the purchase of new Low-Carbon Technology. For example, a successful grant application could result in a social housing scheme or community centre being awarded funding to contribute to the cost of EV chargers, solar panels, battery storage or backup, low carbon heating systems, smart heating controls, or other general energy efficiency measures. Grants of up to £20,000 will be awarded to successful applicants in this category.

Note: SSEN is aware there are often lengthy lead times associated with community project preparations, as well as getting approval to connect some low carbon technologies. In light of this, SSEN is advising applicants to consider projects that have already been approved to apply in the current round, as the timescales for awarding and spending funds may be more likely to align. Those who are uncertain of their timescales can contact colin.mcmillan@sse.com to discuss this in more detail.

The deadline for applications to both categories is **5pm on Saturday 31**st **August 2024**, and applicants are asked to consider the criteria in the fund guidelines. The application documents can be downloaded on our website www.ssen.co.uk/pcnz. This gives full details of what can be supported by the fund as well as guidance on which projects will be prioritised.

The PCNZ Fund Panel, will review applications and determine which projects should receive funding, with the successful applications announced in late October.



Records of a Bygone Age Stronsay Schools Part 9 – War and peace, long service and new beginnings

We left the school in last month's article just as war had broken out, with the school and the island in a state of apprehension regarding the future.

It was noted in the log dated 25th September 1939 that the Secondary Departments of all country schools were to be closed until Monday 9th October to allow pupils to help with the harvest at home or on neighbouring farms.

Then, at the end of October, it was intimated that from 1st November to 1st February the school would open at 9.45 am and close at 2.45 pm. This was to help make maximum use of daylight and ensure that all the pupils could go to school and return home while there was still adequate light for their journey.

With war in the forefront of everyone's minds, there was an alarming moment at 1.30 pm on 14th November 1939 when an air raid warning was sounded and, as most of the pupils hadn't yet been supplied with their gas masks, school was dismissed and the children sent home. Fortunately this was a false alarm.

There was an outbreak of German Measles in March 1940 affecting many of the pupils and also some of the teachers. It was to be 15th June before the last pupil to contract the virus was back in class and the epidemic over.

In December 1941 note was made that the children were practising games and dancing in preparation for the SWRI's annual children's party. This same month saw some atrocious weather, described by Mr Drever as 'hurricane force winds, heavy rain, sleety showers, blizzards, flying storms, spindrift all over the sea and large snowdrifts.'

Teacher James Sinclair joined the Royal Air Force in April 1941, with the teaching of his classes being shared between Mrs Wilson and the headmaster.

The school closed for 4 weeks holidays in the summer and then a further 4 weeks from 13th September until 12th October for the harvest.

On 20th November 1941 53 pupils were sent to Dr Pyle to be inoculated against diphtheria, with a second inoculation given 2 weeks later. This, Mr Drever recorded, was a war time measure although in actual fact it appears to have been the first of the mass vaccination programme against the disease.

A police officer visited the school in March 1942, noted in the log as "re insulators etc." This visit may well have been instigated by some of the pupils being involved in breaking the porcelain insulators carrying the phone wires on the telegraph poles, no doubt quite a tempting target for young boys with stones.

To help the war effort that spring a collection of waste paper was made and sent to Kirkwall. Then, on 28th May 1942 Miss Barnett from the Ministry of Food visited the school to issue the new food and clothing ration books to each pupil.

Ralph Fotheringhame of Boondatoon, who had been chair of the School Management Committee, a member of the County Council, a JP and had been involved in education in the island for more than 50 years, died in December 1942. His funeral was held on 7th December and, as a mark of respect, the headmaster and 9 of the older pupils attended on behalf of the school.

There was another bad flu epidemic in March and April 1943, laying low teachers and pupils alike, quickly followed by an outbreak of German Measles and then whooping cough.

When school reopened in August 1943 it was recorded that the school roll stood at 61 and that Mrs Wilson had been transferred to another school, with probationer Miss Margaret Hay taking over her role. By October Miss Hay had been transferred to Sandwick and Mrs Wilson reinstated!


Whooping cough and chicken pox was still affecting attendance levels in October and then, on 1st November, the school was closed for 2 weeks due to an outbreak of Scarlet Fever. It seems that resistance to bugs and viruses must have been very low at the time, although at least the epidemics would have built up the natural resistance to reinfection for many of the pupils.

In May 1944 Mr McDougall from Kirkwall came out to the school and, in the morning, spoke to the pupils as part of the 'Salute the Soldiers week', aimed at raising funds for field hospitals and military equipment. He then gave the children a cinema show in the Public Hall in the afternoon.

Miss Gorie was absent from October to Christmas to look after her father, who was seriously ill, with Mrs Helen Groat (nee Inkster) of Lower Millfield deputising for her.

An outbreak of mumps affected the island early in 1945, with nearly every pupil who hadn't previously been affected succumbing this time round. With this epidemic only recently past, the school was shut for 2 weeks in April due to an outbreak of measles.

On a much happier note, the school was shut on 8th and 9th May 1945 as Victory in Europe Days and again on 15th and 16th August as Victory over Japan Days, celebrations that would have been greeted with delight and relief by young and old alike. The celebration of the end of the war wasn't yet complete as the following year, as part of the nationwide Victory Celebrations held on 8th June 1946, each pupil was given a shilling, gifted by the Education Department as 'sports money' for Victory day.

In September 1946 Miss Patricia Chalmers of Comely Bank, who was a student at Edinburgh Provincial College, taught at the Central School for 3 weeks as part of her teacher training. She was to be another local lass who was destined to become a long serving and respected member of the school staff.

Magnus Dennison from Ellerslie was appointed as school janitor in May 1947 at a salary of £75 per year. He took over the post from J Price Sinclair who had been holding the fort since Brenda Moodie had given up the post some time previously.

On 7th October 1947 four pupils from the Rothiesholm school started at the central school, driven there by Sydney Swanney of James Swanney (motor hirers). The four were Irene Miller from Millgrip, Jean and Hugh Stevenson from the Bu and Emma Peace from Brigend. This was occasioned by their teacher Miss Mary D Drever going off to Edinburgh to live and work, with the local Education Authority taking the opportunity not to replace her but to close the Rothiesholm School instead. These four additions took the Central School roll up to 76.

A public holiday for another happy occasion took place on 20th November 1947 with the wedding of Princess Elizabeth, the elder daughter of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, to Philip Mountbatten, who was given the title 'Duke of Edinburgh' that same day. Another festive holiday was given on 26th April the following year to celebrate the Silver Wedding Anniversary of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth.

John Shearer took over from Mr Marwick as Orkney's Director of Education in December 1946. He visited the school in December 1947 and Mr Drever recorded that he kept pupil Douglas Cooper back 'to talk to him about his behaviour.' We would be led to the assumption here that this behaviour may have been less than exemplary!

Mrs Jessie Wilson's last day at the Central was 30th January 1948, moving to Clochan School in Moray to take up a post there. Mrs Peggy Swanney (nee Firth) took over her role as teacher of P4 and P5 soon after. In November of that same year local joiner James Mitchell from Ocean View was appointed as a part-time teacher of woodwork.

In April 1950 Mrs Swanney was absent and her class was taken by Miss Muriel Drever from Westray, a 5th year student from Kirkwall, who was on holiday in Stronsay

In February 1951 the headmaster was off ill and newly ordained island minister Rev Philip Fox took his classes, something Rev Fox was called on to do voluntarily a number of times over the years.

In August 1951 Miss Gorie retired from the school, with Mrs Pat Sinclair taking over from her. High tribute was paid to Miss Gorie by staff, pupils and the wider community in celebration of her service of over 40 years as teacher in the school. The roll at this time had crept up a little, to stand at 85.

Mr Drever's log entry of 15th January 1952 records a hurricane that morning, at its height from 4.00 am until 7.00 am and reaching speeds in excess of 120 miles per hour, causing great damage all over Orkney. Part of the roof of the school was torn off by the wind and the school was shut that day and until further notice. With devastation all over the island to be dealt with, it wasn't until 4th February that workmen were able to complete repairs to the roof and enable the school to be reopened.

In April that year the Education Committee sent retired Post Office worker Robert Wilson out to the school to teach singing. He was in Stronsay for a fortnight, giving lessons at both the South, where Mrs Fiddler was now teaching, and Central School, and it appears that his teaching was very much appreciated by those attending.

The North Isles inter-island sports day was held on 7th June 1952, with the event being held in Eday and the school being shut for the day. This annual event, the only day of the year where North Isles residents were able to meet together and return home the same day, was set to become a permanent fixture in both school and island calendars.

The annual school sports and picnic was held in the Hunton field north of the school on 1st July 1953 with 67 pupils present, together with 16 pre-school children. It was noted that the scholars were all given 'a poke of good things with a bottle of lemonade.'

When the school reopened on 27th August 1955 it was stated in the log that school hours were to be 9.30 am until 4.00 pm each day, with a lunch break from 1.00 until 2.00pm. School was to be dismissed at 3.30 pm during the winter months, with only a half hour break for lunch.

It was also noted that at that time Mrs Maxwell was teaching 26 primary pupils in classes 1, 2, 3 and 4 with Mrs Groat in charge of 25 pupils in primary 5, 6 and 7. With a further 15 pupils in Secondary under the charge of Mr Drever this gave a total roll of 66.

Moving on to 1956, the school was closed on 31st May for the annual trip day to Kirkwall, organised jointly by the SWRI and the South End Men's Club. It was closed again on 5th June for the North Isles Sports in Westray, with 50 Stronsay folk making the day trip up to Westray.

The end of an era was recorded at the school on 6th July with the retirement of 65 year old headmaster John Drever who had been in post for 35 years. Local councillor William Work from Holland spoke in appreciative terms of the headmaster's long and dedicated service to the school, the pupils and the island following which Rev Fox spoke of Mr Drever's service to the Church as Session Clerk, Organist and Sunday School Superintendent.

Miss Mary Gorie, herself a recently retired teacher and island stalwart, then spoke appreciatively of Mr Drever as a teacher and colleague for so many years before presenting him with a handsome gold watch from the people of the island. Former pupil Miss Emma Peace of Brigend, who was the current dux of Kirkwall Grammar School, then presented Mrs Drever with a beautiful Stafford China tea set.

In what was to be another long association with the school and the island, Mr Walter Forrest was appointed as the new school headmaster and took up his duties on 3^{rd} September 1956. The staff at that time was Elma Maxwell, teaching 32 Primary 1, 2 and 3 pupils, with Helen (Nell) Groat in charge of the 22 pupils in Primary 4 – 7 and Walter Forrest instructing the 21 Secondary pupils. On Tuesday and Thursday afternoon the Secondary girls were instructed in cookery by Mrs Forrest while the boys were taught woodwork by David Fotheringhame.


The log entry for 11th March 1957 noted a welcome new service for school pupils and staff with the introduction of hot meals at lunch time, something which had first been strongly recommended by His Majesty's Inspectorate some 40 years before. The record stated that 'Pending the erection of a dining centre, a modified arrangement for school meals was inaugurated today, under the supervision of Miss Firth, County Meals Organiser. The scholars are to receive a one course hot meal at the luncheon interval. Miss Elizabeth Stevenson has been appointed cook and, together with her assistant, Mrs Work, commenced duties today.' Both these ladies were to become something of an institution at the school, with May Work in the school kitchen until she retired in the mid 1970s and Liz Stevenson serving as a highly regarded cook until her own retirement 37 years and around half a million school lunches later!

Less than two weeks later another new service, probably as essential to pupils but certainly less popular, saw the introduction of the School Dental Service. This first recorded visit of a dentist specifically for scholars was noted on 22nd March 1957, with Mr James Clunas examining and treating scholars from that date until the 28th of the month. This first visit and a number of subsequent annual visits made use of a room in the school for examination and treatment but after a few years a dedicated caravan was fitted up for the purpose and Mr Clunas and his caravan appearing at the school became an annual event.

Heavy snowfalls in the early part of 1958 again caused disruption to the school and the wider community, with roads recorded as being blocked from the 20th to the 30th January and again from the 6th until the 14th of February. The snowfall wasn't yet over, with heavy snowfalls and the roads blocked once more from the 1st until the 14th of March. A whooping cough epidemic hit the island around the same time, with the last cases being recorded at the end of April.



This is a photo of the Central School as it would have looked for much of the first half of the 20th century. I'm grateful to Raymond Dennison for his sketch, shown below, of the layout of the school at that time.



With a major refurbishment and extension taking place at the school that same year, Mrs Maxwell's lower primary classes were being taught in the Public Hall while the building works were carried out. With snow and frosty conditions hampering progress on this project this interim measure was to last for quite some time.

Another landmark for education on Stronsay was reached on 1st September 1958. This marked the start of a new term and a new academic year in what was to all intents and purposes a new school with large, light and airy classrooms, dedicated spaces for domestic subjects and woodwork and metalwork. There was also a new kitchen and large dining room which also doubled up as a drill hall, assembly room and, with a stage on one end, also served as a concert hall. This was to be the start of a new era for the Stronsay Central School, its pupils and its teachers and so, although much of its more recent history is yet to tell, this seems an appropriate place to bring this account of the history of education in Stronsay and the Central School to an end.

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

Fulfilling since 2012 my promise to keep the folk of the North Isles updated on what I am doing.

There has just been the first change in the ruling political party at Westminster since I became a councillor, and Larry, the 10 Downing Street cat has his 6th Prime Minister. Congratulations to Alistair Carmichael on his reelection. The result of the SNP's "de-facto referendum" on independence was unequivocal. I hope this will bring some stability to Scotland. It would be the honourable thing for the Scotlish Government now to call an early election at Holyrood. (The SNP can't complain any longer that Scotland hasn't got the UK Government it voted for, although, as usual, Orkney can.) I, myself, do not belong to any political party and am truly independent.

We held our last General Meeting before the councillor recess. A few final appointments were confirmed, and I remain on the Health & Wellbeing Survey Short-Life Working Group. Because of the recent changes in chair and leadership positions at the "reshuffle", plus the election of a new councillor, it was decided that a new group photograph of us all is needed. Here is one that was taken whilst we were setting up (the arrow indicates me):



I was away with family members attending my son Wulfric's Master of Architecture graduation at Edinburgh University (see photograph below) when the seventy-seven pilot whales came ashore at Tresness on Sanday. On my return, I sat in on a couple of operational meetings to determine how best to dispose of their remains. Appreciation is due to (among others): Hayley Green (Corporate Director, Neighbourhood Services & Infrastructure) and her team at OIC, Colin and Heather Headworth, Stephen Kemp (Orkney Builders), various landowners who offered sites for burial plots, James Muir and the other Sanday farmers he co-ordinated to transport and bury the carcasses, Emma Neave-Webb (British Divers Marine Life Rescue), and Andy Wilcox (Chairman, Sanday Community Council). I witnessed members of this group metaphorically draft the definitive textbook on how to deal effectively and efficiently with a large number of beached whales. Given the likelihood of it happening again somewhere in Orkney, I have asked for mass cetacean strandings to be added to the relevant OIC risk register. The Sanday (10th Orkney) Cubs, Scouts & Explorer Scouts Recipe Book, published in 2011, contains a Kwakwaka'wakw whale recipe for just such eventualities. Shame we weren't able to try it out!

In my last Letter I mentioned that whilst in Lerwick in June for a meeting of the Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board, a few of us took the opportunity to visit the Shetland Abattoir and speak to people involved in running it. This was followed up by a good write-up about our visit on page 13 of the 11th July issue of The Orcadian.

Other councillor work I've been doing during the recess includes a meeting of the Dounreay Stakeholder Group.

So far this has been a somewhat eventful recess! And so far it has also been a fairly rainy recess. (It was a mixed picture on Saint Swithin's Day, which might be grounds for optimism.) The weather has confused my bees. I had a summer solstice swarm, and for the first time in my over 2 decades of beekeeping, I've had to feed the bees in June and July. Normally at this time of year they are gathering nectar and producing honey for me.
