

ORKNEY FERRIES—REFIT TIMETABLE, MV NORDIC SEA



An additional week-day passenger service will operate between Sanday, Stronsay, Eday and Kirkwall during the annual winter refit timetable. The MV Nordic Sea will provide the additional foot passenger capacity from Monday 6 January 2025 until Friday 7 March 2025, subject to weather conditions. Additional sailings will operate from Mondays through to Fridays. The MV Nordic Sea, which can carry up to 47 passengers, fills a gap during periods of refit and adds capacity for services under increased demand during the summer months. As the relief boat, the Nordic Sea may be required to cover any breakdowns within the fleet. Service provision will therefore be subject to availability.

REVIEW OF POLLING DISTRICTS AND POLLING PLACES 2024

The following has been received from the Corporate Director, Strategic, Performance and Business Solutions and if anyone has any comment or issue regarding the polling districts and polling places, please forward these to <u>electionoffice@orkney.gov.uk</u> by <u>5pm on Monday 16 December 2024.</u>

In accordance with Section 18C of the Representation of the People Act 1983, as amended, Orkney Islands Council is undertaking a review of polling districts and polling places within the Orkney Islands Area of the Orkney and Shetland Parliamentary Constituency.

In order to assist us with the review I would like to take this opportunity to invite any comments from yourself with regards to the current arrangements in place for Polling Stations. I enclose herewith the <u>list of current Polling Stations which was used at the UK parliamentary election earlier this year along with the comments for any proposed changes, a map of where the polling stations are situated and a questionnaire, all for your information. I have also attached a link <u>here</u> for you to complete the questionnaire online if you prefer.</u>

In respect of Kirkwall East and Kirkwall West the proposal is to change the polling station to the Pickaquoy Centre. In addition, although the North and South ferry-linked isles are predominantly postal voting, for those who wish to vote in person, e.g. electors residing in Hoy & Walls, Flotta and North Isles, it is proposed that the polling station is also the Pickaquoy Centre. Previously, the St Magnus Centre has been used however parking is limited at this venue, and space within the venue for the 7 polling stations has led to a crowded venue, particularly at busy times. In recent elections, the Pickaquoy Centre has been used on a temporary basis and provided a more spacious environment with ample parking. We would welcome views on the suitability of this venue.

I would also welcome any comments with regard to accessibility, ease of use etc.

Your assistance in this matter is very much appreciated.



Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

Championing the communities of the North Isles, both the ferry-only-linked and the air-linked.

There has been a lot going on at Orkney Islands Council in the run-up to Christmas. Since my last Letter, I have attended members' briefings with the OIC Chief Executive, a budget-setting consolidation seminar, a seminar on the Orkney World Heritage Gateway and Islands Growth Deal, a seminar about strategic offshore energy development, two all-day meetings of the Policy & Resources Committee, refresher training for the Monitoring & Audit Committee, a General Meeting, and a Special General Meeting (on our Strategic Offshore Energy Development Strategy). In addition to these "real" meetings, I've had "virtual" meetings of the UHI Foundation, the Orkney Housing Market Partnership, and the Dounreay Stakeholder Group. I've also chaired the Orkney end of a "blended" meeting of the Orkney & Shetland Valuation Joint Board.

Our big task early in the new year will be to set the Council's budget for 2025/26. This becomes an ever more onerous task as finances tighten. Provided their budget proposals are approved, there is some good news from the Scottish Government, with extra funding for our ferries and free travel on those ferries (the Isles' buses) for the under-22s in the offing. However, OIC will still need to balance its own budget by a combination of increasing income and making cuts. To help inform our decisions, the public is invited to complete the "Our Budget Challenge" survey (deadline 12th January), a link to which can be found at the top of the Council website or directly at https://www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/AA8ROT/. Just like the many ward constituents who have contacted me, I recognise the shortcomings and biases of this survey. Sanday Community Council made some cogent comments about it in their letter to The Orcadian (19th December, page 32). There are several proposals in the survey that would chip away yet further at the sustainability of our island communities were they to be adopted: charging for pupils to stay at the Papdale Halls to attend extra-curricular activities; charging for Hall placing requests; charging for our rubbish bags; removal of home-based registrars. So I urge North Isles residents of all ages to make their views known by completing the survey and making copious use of the comments boxes. I need the evidence of public opinion to champion our communities and defend their services.

Incidentally, I find the recently in-vogue term "ferry-linked isles" a misleading one, as it does not distinguish between the "ferry-only-linked isles" and the "air-linked isles" whose respective challenges differ. So, like the term "internal ferries" (which separates our ferries and their funding from the overall Scottish ferry network), I would like to discourage the use of this term.

Over the years, since the early 1990s when I lived in Aberdeen, Robbie Shepherd occasionally indulged my requests to play Harry Gordon's "Inversnecky" songs on his Sunday lunchtime "Reel Blend" programme on BBC Radio Scotland. And on the 7th January 2019, when my "Musical Milestones" were broadcast on BBC Radio Orkney, one of the twelve tracks played was Harry Gordon singing "The Bells of Inversnecky". Where is Inversnecky? I hear you ask. When I posed this question to an esteemed professor of the UHI's Institute for Northern Studies, the response was "Inverness". However, I remained firmly of the school that "Inversnecky" is a coastal village near Aberdeen—nothing at all to do with Inverness. So it was reassuring recently to come across the following confirmation in the book "The Granite City" by Robert Smith: "When people asked where it was, Buff Hardie and his colleagues [Scotland the What?] reeled off a list of North-East villages—Maud, Methlick, Udny, Rhynie, Foggie and so on—and then said it wasn't any of them. But, they added, it could be one of them."

I wish all readers of my Letter, from Seal Skerry to Inversnecky, a happy, healthy and prosperous 2025.

Records of a Bygone Age Flag fences, ditches and dry-stone dykes Part 5

Last month's article ended by highlighting the need for regular maintenance of both dykes and flag fences to keep them in good condition. When labour was plentiful, the maintenance of these would have been carried out during the winter months or slack periods during the summer, amounting to little more than replacing a few ragstones or straightening a flag or two. As time passed, guard wires, originally barbed wire but now more commonly electric fencing, was strung along the tops of the dykes to stop the cattle, ever increasing in number and size, from scratching themselves on the 'rag stones' (coping stones) of the dykes. This regular maintenance was essential as, if these stones were dislodged, then more of the dyke quickly followed and soon the animals would have a gap in the dyke where they could cross from one field to another, with this breach in the boundary steadily getting larger as stock moved unhindered between fields. As farms got larger and the workforce smaller, it became increasingly difficult to find time for this maintenance and there are a number of dykes in Stronsay where large sections have been flattened over the years by stock movement. Sadly it would now be a major task to attempt to rebuild them.

Not all is due to degeneration or neglect though, as nature can also play its part. There is a stretch of about 150 metres along the foreshore below Midgarth where the sea washed the dyke away, some of it a long time ago and the last stretch in the 1980s. This last stretch of about 50 metres was all rebuilt one summer, with the work being completed in July and the sea reclaiming it in a November storm. It hasn't been rebuilt!

There are other sections below Whitehall, Odiness and Hescombe where heavy seas and high tides have destroyed some of the dykes and no doubt more will succumb to the sea as time goes on.

Yet one more reason for a dyke's destruction came from a more unusual source, as recounted by my wife's grandfather, the late James Chalmers of the Old Schoolhouse. He was a member of the Orkney Royal Garrison Artillery in the First World War and his unit was stationed for a time at a camp near the point of Linksness on Stronsay's northwestern coast. This was where the telegraph cable from Stronsay headed over to Sanday and onward to Shetland and was a vital link in communication between the islands and also between these islands and mainland Scotland. The unit's task was to protect the small telegraph building and the undersea cable in the event of an invasion. Stretching right across the promontory at this point was a substantial drystone wall, the march dyke marking the boundary between the farms of Linksness and the Ness. The artillery unit's commanding officer decided that, in the event of an invasion, this dyke could be used as suitable cover for a German assault force to creep up on them, so decided the dyke had to go.

The unit set to with heavy hearts to demolish the dyke and, in just a few days, it was flattened to the ground. This wall was never rebuilt, much to James' regret as he so much hated seeing such a good solid dyke destroyed. He then finished his story with a twinkle in his eye and the comment that 'It must have been fairly effective all the same, as Stronsay was never invaded!'



More than a hundred years after its hasty demolition all that remains of the march dyke between Linksness and the Ness is a rough mound with a few of the larger stones still jutting up through the grass.

Dykes utilising 'cungles' (large round sea-worn beach stones) are less common but there are still some great examples to be seen around Stronsay. This must have been a much more challenging raw material than the stones and flagstones previously mentioned and the most visible of these is the dyke at the Osen, where it encloses the garden and the field to the sea side of the farm. There is a similar section of dyke along the foreshore to the west of the Bu and it is testimony to the skill of the builders of both dykes that they are still standing and in very good condition today.

Much older example of dykes - possibly some of the oldest on Stronsay - can also be seen in Rothiesholm, out along the shore at Scaval and, less visibly, at Straenie Water.

Much of the Rothiesholm peninsula consisted of heather and peat which, in addition to providing fuel for the crofters' fires, was common land used for grazing sheep. This area of hill ground was described in the Old Statistical Account of 1795 as being 'a sheep walk of great extent' and, with the narrow strips of land at Scaval and Straenie Water providing good natural funnels for gathering the sheep, it is highly likely that those stone built enclosures would have been in existence then. Although now slowly collapsing and becoming overgrown, much of the layout of the pens and enclosures at Scaval can still be identified but the passage of time and the effects of the sea has made that at Straenie Water less obvious.

OUTER NORTH ISLES TIMETABLE – SUMMER 2025

The Orkney Islands Council Service Manager – Transportation, has advised that unfortunately, the amendments proposed to the Outer North Isles timetable cannot be accommodated by Orkney Ferries Ltd at this time due to the implications this would have to the maintenance/training schedule, crewing hours and hours of work regulations. The Transportation Service and Orkney Ferries Ltd are currently looking at alternative ways to serve the Outer North Isles during Summer 2025, including the possibility of a passenger vessel, in preparation of the future trials by electric passenger vessel later in 2025. This proposal will be subject to crewing availability and budget. Further consultation with the relevant transport representatives and stakeholders will be undertaken prior to timetable setting for any proposed passenger service.

Background

The draft timetables in respect of ferry services to be operated by Orkney Ferries Limited during summer 2025 was presented to the Ferry Services Consultative Forum for consideration on 20 August 2024 following a period of consultation with communities.

The draft timetables and feedback from the Ferry Services Consultative Forum was presented to the Board of Orkney Ferries on 5 September 2024.

The report and draft timetables will be considered by the Development and Infrastructure Committee on 12 November 2024.

Outer North Isles Timetable

For operational reasons, the Monday and Wednesday sailings to Westray have been amended to revert to 1035 from 1200. The later sailing was trialled during summer 2024 however the timetable change did not provide sufficient turnaround time for crew to carry out essential maintenance checks.

A request was made from the Westray Transport Representative to amend the sailings to 1300 as it was more suitable for the community. Following consideration by Orkney Ferries it was noted that this request could not be accommodated as it would have an impact to the timetable and crewing hours.

An amendment to the timetable was made on Friday mornings to give a more realistic arrival time to Kirkwall, noting that the arrival times are often delayed. This affected the Sanday arrival into Kirkwall due to delays on the loading of the Papa Westray vessel and only one linkspan.

It was noted by all North Isles Transport Representatives that the Friday timetable pushed the vessels to arrive later at Kirkwall which was not a preferred option. For example, the Stronsay/Eday vessel would arrive at 1120 instead of 1100.

It was noted that the loss of overnighting in the isles has meant the loss of early morning sailings on a Wednesday and Friday morning and due to crewing hours, it is not feasible to start the operating day earlier without pulling back the timetable elsewhere.

To address the comments received from members of the community about delays to Kirkwall and conflicts with appointment times, the summer 2024 timetable now better reflects the arrival times into Kirkwall, noting that earlier times cannot be achieved due to crewing hours.

A passenger service covering the Outer North Isles will be explored further with the view to implement during summer 2025 ahead of the ZEVI trial period. This service could potentially provide early morning connectivity which was lost following the loss of overnighting the vessels in the isles. This will be explored furthear by Orkney Ferries and will be subject to budget availability.

The Outer North Isles Sunday Excursion timetable will be finalised once all key dates are received back from communities.

Accompanying the above update is a DRAFT of the Summer 2025 Outer North Isles ferry timetable (see next page).

The Digital Phone Switchover



What you need to know

What is the digital phone switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and January 2027 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines over to new upgraded landline services using digital technology. This means services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones, telecare and health devices will need to be compatible.



The good news is – your landline isn't going anywhere and for most consumers and businesses, this change will be straightforward. In fact, many customers are already making the switch when they upgrade to fibre broadband.

Your telecoms provider (for example, Vodafone or BT) should contact you before the switchover to check in and discuss what you need to do to make sure any reliant services you may have aren't affected. However, we're encouraging everyone to know what to expect.

The change may be as simple as plugging your phone into a broadband router rather than the phone socket on the wall, or you may be given a new router to do this.

Please note that your provider will move you to a digital service before January 2027. If you care for a vulnerable person, please keep an eye out for correspondence notifying of a switch over date.

What you need to know

Other Devices

If you have other devices connected to your phone line that you may have purchased, such as alarm systems, you might need to upgrade your device to make sure it is compatible.

If you are unsure about how a device in your home or business might be affected, it is recommended you contact the equipment supplier or device manufacturer to find out whether it will remain functional on a digital phone line.

People who use health monitoring or telecare devices should check if the switchover will affect how they work.

Key Points To Remember

If you have any queries or have no means of making emergency calls you need to contact your communications provider.

If you have a telecare alarm please contact the telecare team at Orkney Islands Council: 01856 873 535 Extension: 2635

Check with the appropriate equipment manufacturers if you have any other devices supported by your existing telephone line (such as intruder alarms) to check it will work digitally.

Most telecare alarm providers will have upgrade plans, if your phone line has or is due to an upgraded by your communication provider let them know.

In a Power Outage

Digital landlines cannot carry an electrical power connection, so in the event of a power cut they will not work. If you have a mobile phone this can still be used, but if you've no other means of calling the emergency services your telecoms provider will offer a solution to allow calls to be made to emergency services.

You should tell your telecoms provider now if you have no other way of making emergency calls.

Scams

There have been incidents reported of scammers contacting vulnerable users in relation to digital migration.

Communication providers or telecare services will never call you to ask for money.

Contact is usually by letter and charges are only applied to normal invoices. If you are in any doubt as to the authenticity of a caller, just hang up and call your communications or telecare provider to report the incident, using a trusted phone number, such as the one on the bill.
