### Isabella Margaret Peace Miller

Peace as she was known to all her friends, and she had many, was born at Briarlea ,the home of her grandparents on the 25<sup>th</sup> of May 1943. Peace was the second child of Leslie and Elizabeth Miller who were living at Holland farm where Leslie worked as a ploughman. As was the custom at the time Elizabeth returned to her parents home for her delivery. The family lived on at Holland for several years, moving to a wooden house at Gesty, before moving to Felsquoy which her father had bought. This was home to the family, now increased to three children by the addition of a younger brother, until 1961 when her parents



returned to Briarlea to look after her grandparents whose health was failing.

Peace attended the South School until she was twelve when she went to the Central School. On leaving school she worked at home and on the farm, supplementing this with domestic work on the Island. This led on to her becoming a home help, possibly the first to hold such a post on the Island a position she held until her retirement at age 60. She married Walter Miller in 1969 and moved to Clestrain Cottage. Following her marriage she frequently returned to Briarlea to help her elder brother Irvine on the farm. Irvine had been her companion/chaperone when she attended her first dance at the age of 12, something which developed in to a life long passion. Peace attended local dance classes and enjoyed encouraging new comers to learn the traditional dance steps, something which has shown its rewards in the superb spectacle of the dance floor at the local dances being crowded with dancers of all ages, all knowing the intricate steps of the old and not so old dances.

After her retirement from domestic employment Peace worked in the village shop, something which continued until shortly before her final illness took its untimely toll. She was, despite her increasing disability, able to dance at her adopted son Leslies wedding to Louise. She was extremely moved by Leslies biological brother's decision to include the name Peace in his baby daughters name when she was born a



short time before the end. This showed the love and respect she engendered in all who came to know her. Peace died in the Macmillan Unit at the Balfour Hospital on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of October after a fairly short but rapidly progressive illness. Stronsay will be a poorer place in her absence.

Peace is survived by her husband Walter, her elder brother Irvine, her younger brother Jim, her son Leslie and daughter in law Louise

# Ernest Cooper 1921 - 2007

Ernest Cooper was born in the parish of Holm on 1st August 1921, the youngest of four boys. Both his parents were from Stronsay, but had moved to New Holland, Holm some four-teen years earlier.

In 1922 the family bought the farm of Cleat and moved back to Stronsay. Five years later they bought Odiness, where Ernie moved with his parents and brothers leaving an uncle and an aunt at Cleat.

Ernie went to the South School until he was eleven years old, then moved to the Central School and got a Shetland pony as his school transport.

After leaving school he worked at Odiness taking over the



farm when his father retired. Ernie married Iris Williamson from Castlehill in October 1959. Ernie attended Church regularly and became an Elder in 1975. Ernie was the chairman of the local branch of the National Farmers Union for two years, a keen supporter of the local Hall and Community Association acting as their treasurer for many years.

Failing health forced Ernie to retire and he moved to Kirkwall with his wife Iris in 1983. He worked for a time as quality controller at a fish factory and used to joke that he got his first pay packet at the age of 62.

Ernie and Iris always enjoyed having visitors and meeting new people. Both became active members of the East Church. Ernie was a keen Liberal and also enjoyed watching Aberdeen play football on TV.

Ernie did not have good health in later years and sadly died at the Balfour Hospital on 22nd October 2007 Jim Cooper

In March 1983, on the 50th anniversary of the consecration of Lodge Kildinguie, as Grand Chaplain of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Orkney and Zetland, Jim conducted the re-dedication service of the Lodge in a most professional and sincere manner. In total, Jim has held office for some 48 years, and is presently Chaplain of the Lodge, an office he has held since 1984.

The kids had a great time "dookan for apples", finding the "nail in the bale", and taking part in other competitions.



# "HIS OWN PRIVATE JET" by Dr George McKay

The decision was now made to attempt to tow the net and its unknown burden towards the shore some ten miles distant. The engine was put on ahead and slowly they started to limp homewards. Soon they were overtaken by another boat on her way to port. A call on the radio explained their position and the skipper of the Golden Bells made the offer that although there was nothing that he could do at this stage in the tow, he would go in, land his catch and come out to stand by them and offer any help once they had dragged the unknown object in towards shallower water where it would once again rest on the sea bed. This offer of help was gratefully accepted and the slow progress continued. It took two or three hours to cover the next few miles before finally the burden hit the sea bed. The boat was now stopped, a new roller put in place and the weight again taken on the winch. It was immediately obvious that the object was still in the net. At this stage the Golden Bells, who had now arrived back on the scene offered to shoot a circle of rope around their gear and, hopefully, being a bigger and more powerful boat, be able to help in lifting their gear. This was duly accomplished and soon the strain eased from their own gear as the other boat started to take up the weight. The warps were now thrown off the winch and cut and passed to the Golden Bells who now had full control of the operation. At last her skipper reported that he had the bridles of the net up but could do nothing more. The decision was then taken to tow the net to the harbour until it again grounded and hopefully be able to lift it with a crane. The Golden Bells now proceeded at almost full speed in an attempt to put as much lift as possible on the gear and headed for home, with their own boat following in her wake. Just as the Bells entered the entrance channel of the harbour it was obvious that she came to a sudden halt then surged ahead again. Finally the object had hit the shallow sea bed again, cut through the restraining net and now lay resting somewhere close to the harbour entrance. The immediate worry was that it would obstruct the entry channel but this did not seem all that likely. The first thing was to get their injured crewman home and checked out. Fortunately he had sustained no serious injury and within a week or so returned to sea.

The following morning, before the town was astir, the remaining three crew members were back on the boat. Slowly they sailed out of the harbour entrance in flat calm conditions and crystal clear water to search for yesterdays obstruction. The first thing they noticed, just inside the outer point of the entrance pier was a flat piece of metal. It was obvious that this alone could not have caused the problem. As they slowly cruised out past the lighthouse his other uncle, glancing overboard, suddenly shouted and pointed downwards. The boat was stopped and there lying on the sea bed was the complete fuselage, minus wings and tail but with the engine folded back into the cockpit, of an R.A.F. jet. At least now they could see what had caused all the problems of yesterday. The wreckage was well clear of the entrance channel and was therefore left alone. A report was made to the appropriate authorities and they were later visited by members of the Royal Navy who responded in time honoured fashion "Oh, well done, chaps. We will send divers down to identify and probably lift the wreckage"

Divers were sent down and the plane identified and buoyed. It was confirmed that the plane had crashed while on exercise from the nearby base at Lossiemouth in the nineteen fifties, The pilot had bailed out but unfortunately his parachute failed to open. His body was later recovered by one of the boats fishing the area a few weeks later. The buoy the divers attached remained visible for some time but during the course of the ensuing winter gales finally disappeared No attempt was ever made to recover the wreckage and as far as I am aware it still lies close off the harbour entrance.

# Latest Bird News

Although generally considered a 'dull' month as regards the weather, November can be an excellent month for birdwatchers, and with easterly winds forecast for a few days around 20th we can still expect a few surprises from mainland Europe, even this late in the year - hopefully Waxwings, Woodcock, Long-eared Owls, and perhaps Redpolls. All likely candidates to cross the North Sea in November - and all likely to be seen around dwellings.

Late October brought a few surprises with several sightings of Jackdaws, including 4 at Dale, 15 at Russland, 38 flying past Castle, and an injured bird found by Eddie Cooper at Ward Hill. This bird regularly comes for food on the lawn. There were a few sightings of Woodcock around this time, including one seen by Leslie Miller in the Banks drive, although most were flushed accidentally from gardens. Kath Kent had good views of a Jack Snipe at Dale on 25th when 12 Brambling also arrived there, and on the same day, a tired Firecrest was discovered sunning itself in the Silage Clamp at Coweshouse in the early morning sunshine. A Yellow-browed Warbler - the last of the year - spent three days in the Lower Millfield/Castle area from 28th-31st October, arriving on the island the same day as a number of Fieldfares and Redwings. A party of 8 Bean Geese flew over The Reserve the same day. Up to 8 Greenfinches have been seen feeding on the rose-hips at Castle, with others elsewhere, and a few small parties of Siskins have been seen - all in late October

A few Blackcaps lingered into early November as usual but had left before the violent storm of 8th, the day a Little Auk was seen flying across the road near Beechwood, driven off towards Burgh Head by the 60-90mph wind.

A pair of Stonechats feeding along the edge of the Bu Loch close to the road near Springwell on 12th November may well stay around the area for some time - weather permitting! A party of 7-8 Reed Buntings have taken up residence on The Reserve this winter but with no reeds in the area the birds have taken advantage of the stems of the several clumps of Pampas Grass in the Castle garden on which to perch. 3-4 Chiffchaffs have been recorded in mid-November - two of these seen by Leonora and Agnes at Hescombe. All were pale 'eastern' types, probably from Western Russia or beyond - perhaps from the same breeding area as the Yellow-browed Warblers?

The Matpow Loch is well worth scanning for duck species at present as there have been regular sightings of Mallard, Teal, Wigeon, Pintail, Tufted Duck, Goldeneye and Long-tailed Duck, and occasional sightings of Gadwall and Scaup there. Also keep an eye out for Hen Harriers which can regularly be seen feeding in the Kirk/Northbank/Dale area.

'One that got away' recently was an American Buff-bellied Pipit seen well but briefly on just one occasion in The reserve drive in late October. All part of the enjoyment of birdwatching!
