NEW HERITAGE CENTRE UPDATE:

It's been a while since we've updated the community on plans for a new heritage centre. When last we updated you, we were planning to partner with the Development Trust to develop the field next to Fagerheim with a new heritage centre and a couple of housing units (the rent from one of which would have helped sustain the heritage centre into the future). However, partly because the site is unserviced and would have required installation of water, electricity, septic and drainage, as well as necessitate the installation of footpaths and complicate road works, the project was deemed too expensive for the Development Trust to support. Taking those issues to heart, the Stronsay Heritage Society is now hoping to build a simpler, one-storey wooden structure in Wood's Yard, which is already owned by the Development Trust and where we could connect to the hydro, water, septic and drainage systems already on site. The project would be far cheaper, and would still allow us to remain near enough to the ferry terminal (but out of the SEPA flood zone) to be easily accessible to all visitors. We are planning to have a table at the Christmas Craft fair and will have more details to share with you then. In the meantime, we thank you for your continued interest and encouragement as we work with the Development Trust to find a permanent home for the heritage collection.

STRONSAY WEST PIER UPDATE

The Deputy Harbour Master has issued the following update on the Stronsay west pier.

"We're pleased to confirm that the underwater survey of the pier was completed ahead of the original schedule for November. The early completion allows us to plan next steps sooner than expected.

The survey has, however, identified a number of areas of concern, including some erosion and holes towards the end of the west pier. In the interest of safety, we've taken the precautionary decision to keep the pier closed while further investigations are carried out to determine the best approach for potential repairs and associated costs.

We appreciate the community's patience and understanding while we work to ensure the long-term safety and integrity of the pier."

Complete the Verification Form and liaise with the haulier for the vehicle's delivery to Kirkwall;

The completed Verification Form must be presented to the scrap yard at the time of vehicle delivery, along with all necessary documentation, (the vehicle's V5 document) to meet the DVLA and dismantler requirements.

A Verification Form will be required for <u>each separate delivery of a car</u> to the scrap yard.


Any individual aged 16 and over may stand for election for the Community Council representing their home address, providing they are on the Electoral Register.

RECENT ART WORKSHOPS ON STRONSAY

Stronsay Island Wellbeing funded four art workshops this past season, providing a joyful time of exploration for island residents. And as the presenter offering creative work to my neighbors, I certainly learned a few things too!

Each activity was based on projects I had personally developed in my career as a middle school art teacher. It is a fact that I taught nearly 10,000 students overr a span of three decades. Without a doubt, the art concepts were well-honed.

Each 3 hour workshop launched at the Community Centre, making use of the large work tables and the magnificent LED flatscreen monitor which offered visual direction and excitement, including music from Bach to The Beatles. We delved into memories, hopes and dreams. We turned basic weaving concepts into logic-defying waves and zigzags. We learned to create effortless blends of intense color using mere whispers of pigment. And we studied the act of seeing transitory objects as an end in itself.

One attendee designed a greeting card sporting 5 collaged goldfish drifting through a pool of geometric colors, into which he inscribed, "Thank you for today and helping us all feel less like fish out of water!" The card was signed by those in attendance, and I have it displayed as a valuable keepsake on the music stand of my piano at Old Schoolhouse.



SCREEN MACHINE VISITS STRONSAY 25/26 NOVEMBER

Extracts from Screen Machine's latest newsletter

We've almost reached our fundraising target!

It's been a while since we've offered an update on Screen Machine 3, but we now have multiple pieces of good news to share.

Through the combination of a £150,000 grant from the Anne Duchess of Westminster Fund, £10,000 from William Grant Foundation, £5,000 from Islay and Dunlossit Trust, an anonymous donation of £10,000, and offers of further donations following a recent fundraising event in Edinburgh, we are now very close to reaching our target. We have also managed to reduce the overall costs of the project to £1.5m thanks to conversations with our suppliers and better-than-expected exchange rates.

Toutenkamion are continuing to build the new machine in France, and it remains on schedule for delivery in the summer of 2026. We're focusing on securing the remaining pledges and grant offers, and creating a Resilience Fund to ensure SM3 can be properly maintained as it endures Scotland's single-track roads, ferries, and variable weather.

We'd like to thank everyone who has contributed to Save Our Screen Machine. Your belief in our service and support to keep it going is what has brought us this far, almost to the finish line!



Analogue to Digital Conversion of the UK Telephony Network by January 2027 Overview

By January 2027, all residents and businesses in the UK connected to the Public Switched Telephony Network (PSTN) managed by BT Group via Openreach will need to adapt their use of landlines. This change marks a significant transition from analogue to digital lines, as the existing telephone exchanges, many of which rely on outdated equipment from the 1980s, will be decommissioned.

Key Changes

- **Digital Transition**: Users will need to connect their landlines through a router, similar to how broadband services are used today.
- **Provider Impact**: Not all telephone service providers are affected. Companies like SKY and TalkTalk operate their own equipment and may not be part of this transition. However, some customers using these services might still be on lines originally from BT, so checking with providers is essential.

Special Services: If you rely on devices like intruder alarms or telecare systems, it's crucial to consult your device provider to ensure compatibility with the new setup.

Importance of the Change

• **Router Requirement**: If you don't already have a compatible router, one will be provided by your supplier. The switchover date will be communicated by your telephone company, and on that day, traditional sockets will cease to function.

Potential Service Disruption: Failing to adapt to the new system could result in losing access to your telephone service.

Notification Process

Individual Timelines: The switchover will occur at different times for different users. While the infrastructure has largely been upgraded, notifications will be sent individually by each telephony provider, potentially at varying times until the January 2027 deadline.

What You Can Do Now

• **Device Audit**: Evaluate all devices connected to your telephone sockets and verify with suppliers if they will function through a router.

Business Considerations: Businesses should similarly assess their equipment to ensure compatibility with the new digital setup.

Be Cautious

Beware of potential scams targeting vulnerable individuals. If you receive any communication requesting payment or claiming urgent action is needed, verify its authenticity by contacting your telephone company directly using the number provided on your bill.


The Digital Phone Switchover



What you need to know

What is the digital phone switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and January 2027 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines over to new upgraded landline services using digital technology. This means services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones, telecare and health devices will need to be compatible.



The good news is – your landline isn't going anywhere and for most consumers and businesses, this change will be straightforward. In fact, many customers are already making the switch when they upgrade to fibre broadband.

Your telecoms provider (for example, Vodafone or BT) should contact you before the switchover to check in and discuss what you need to do to make sure any reliant services you may have aren't affected. However, we're encouraging everyone to know what to expect.

The change may be as simple as plugging your phone into a broadband router rather than the phone socket on the wall, or you may be given a new router to do this.

Please note that your provider will move you to a digital service before January 2027. If you care for a vulnerable person, please keep an eye out for correspondence notifying of a switch over date.

What you need to know

Other Devices

If you have other devices connected to your phone line that you may have purchased, such as alarm systems, you might need to upgrade your device to make sure it is compatible.

If you are unsure about how a device in your home or business might be affected, it is recommended you contact the equipment supplier or device manufacturer to find out whether it will remain functional on a digital phone line.

People who use health monitoring or telecare devices should check if the switchover will affect how they work.

Key Points To Remember

If you have any queries or have no means of making emergency calls you need to contact your communications provider.

If you have a telecare alarm please contact the telecare team at Orkney Islands Council: 01856 873 535 Extension: 2635

Check with the appropriate equipment manufacturers if you have any other devices supported by your existing telephone line (such as intruder alarms) to check it will work digitally.

Most telecare alarm providers will have upgrade plans, if your phone line has or is due to be upgraded by your communication provider let them know.

In a Power Outage

Digital landlines cannot carry an electrical power connection, so in the event of a power cut they will not work. If you have a mobile phone this can still be used, but if you've no other means of calling the emergency services your telecoms provider will offer a solution to allow calls to be made to emergency services.

You should tell your telecoms provider now if you have no other way of making emergency calls.

Contact is usually by letter and charges are only applied to normal invoices. If you are

in any doubt as to the authenticity of a caller, just hang up and call your

communications or telecare provider to report the incident, using a trusted phone number, such as the one on the bill.



Records of a Bygone Age Outward Bound to Australia – Hopes for a new life: Part 2

In last month's article we left young Eday couple James and Rebecca Miller lodging in the passenger depot at Birkenhead waiting to board the ship taking them to their new life in Australia. James had written a letter to Rebecca's parents from Leith and had then sent them another on their arrival in Birkenhead.

These letters home would have been greatly treasured by the family at the time and indeed were carefully looked after and passed down through several generations before eventually reaching Rebecca's great grandniece Margaret Reid (nee Stevenson). Being aware of the Stronsay connection with Rebecca's siblings, which we'll come to in a minute, she thought this was a fascinating piece of local history that was well worth preserving and recording.

The ship James and Rebecca boarded on their way to fulfil their dreams of a new life in Australia was the full-rigged clipper *Guiding Star*. This 1470 ton, 233ft (71m) clipper, which had been built at St John's in Canada just 2 years previously, epitomised all the best in design and safety, with passenger comfort being given higher priority than many ships of that time. Her previous voyage to Melbourne had been achieved in 70 days, this at a time when the average voyage time would have been in excess of 100 days, with the return journey being noted as the second fastest trip on record.

ARRIVAL OF THE GUIDING STAR.

The clipper-ship Guiding Star, of the Golden line, Messrs. Millers and Thompsons, arrived in the Mersey early this morning. She left Port Philip Heads on the 27th July, and has made the passage home in 81 days, being, with the exception of that of the Red Jacket, the fastest passage on record. She is reported to have 100 passengers, a very large cargo, consisting of flour, wool, returned goods, &c., together with 60,000 ounces of gold and 12,000 sovereigns. The Queen of the South steamer sailed before her, and only arrived at Southampton on Saturday; while the Golden Era and several London ships sailed ten days before her, and have not arrived.

After reaching Melbourne in 70 days on her outward journey, the Guiding Star also made a speedy passage on her return trip from Melbourne, as recorded in the Liverpool Standard of 17th October 1854.

It was hoped this voyage would be of similar duration, with this prospect apparently even attracting a bet of £1,000 that she would reach Melbourne within 10 weeks. She departed from Liverpool on 9th January 1855 with a full complement of 62 crew, together with 481 passengers most of whom, like James and Rebecca, were emigrants heading for a new life in Australia and hopes were high for another fast passage.

The *Guiding Star* made good progress as she headed south, averaging about 200 miles a day, with her position being logged and later reported by ships she encountered along the way: the *Speedy* on 28th January; the *Kate Hastings* on 9th February and by the American ship *Mercury* on 15th February, where her Captain noted that she was heading due south and looked in good condition. This, sadly, was to be the last that was ever seen or heard of the *Guiding Star*.

It was common practice at this time for ships bound for Australia to sail as far south into the Southern Ocean as possible, enabling them to pick up favourable westerly winds to enable a speedier passage. While this made for the much sought after quicker passage, it also meant sailing dangerously close to the Southern Ocean icefields, with the everpresent risk of encountering ice floes or icebergs in that area. The sailing ship *George Marshall*, bound on a similar route to Australia as the *Guiding Star* but about 36 hours ahead of her had, in fact, encountered and only narrowly avoided icebergs there on 19th February.



With ship to shore telegraphic communication still decades away it was some time before real concern emerged for the *Guiding Star*'s safety and it wasn't until October 1855, nine months after her departure from Birkenhead, that these fears were first recorded in the newspapers of the time. In all probability it would have been some time after that before James and Rebecca's families back home, waiting anxiously for a letter to tell of their safe arrival in Australia, would receive the tragic news.

Taking the known information into account, it was surmised that she must have encountered that same icefield as recorded earlier by the *George Marshall*, struck an iceberg during the night of $20^{th}/21^{st}$ February and foundered taking James and Rebecca, along with another 479 passengers and 62 crew to a watery grave.

THE GUIDING STAR.— (From our Liverpool Correspondent.)—Great anxiety is at present felt for the safety of the above fine vessel, which left the Mersey in January last, with a large number of government emigrants for Melbourne, and had not arrived at last advices. She was spoken on the 15th of February, in lat. 26.47 S., long. 34 40 W, by the ship Mercury, Capt. Dimon, which arrived at New Bedford in April last. Captain Dimon states that the captain of the Guiding Star informed him that he would stand as far to the southward as possible before running to eastward.

It was to be October 1855 before fears for the Guiding Star's safety emerged.

I haven't been able to find much information about James Miller but here we finally come to the Stronsay link to this story. Three of Rebecca Meil's younger siblings moved to Stronsay: Margaret, who married James Shearer and lived at Housebay; Ann, who married Edward Chalmers, who lived at Huip and later moved to Aikerness in Evie, and Mary, who married widower Robert Croy in 1880 and moved to live with him at Lower Midgarth along with her daughter, also Mary Meil, and Robert's three children from his first marriage.

Robert and Mary had two children together, Janet Craigie Croy and William Croy. William emigrated to New Zealand in 1909, working as a ploughman on his cousin's farm there. He enlisted in the New Zealand Expeditionary Force in 1916 and, after training in Britain, was sent to France in February 1917 where he was killed in action on 12th October 1917. Janet, meantime, married William Dennison and moved to Fingeo where their son James Hamilton Dennison was born.

Mary Meil's first daughter, Mary Meil, married John Miller Stevenson from Park of Housebay, and this Mary and John were the grandparents of Margaret Reid (nee Stevenson), originally from Kirbuster, who was the lady who had carefully preserved the letters. Being aware of the Stronsay connection with Rebecca's siblings, she thought this would be of interest to the Heritage Centre here and kindly passed the letters on to us at the Centre, which has enabled us to research and record this sad tale.

Stephen Clackson's Letter from School Place

A report from your councillor, shortlisted "Community Champion", corporate parent ...

Six years ago, I brought up the problem of what our care-experienced youngsters are supposed to do with their stuff when they leave their care home to go away to study. Without storage facilities back in Orkney, they have to take their entire worldly estate with them wherever they go. In my Letter at the time (Sept 2019), I said I'd been told "OIC is looking into this." I am gratified to say that when I asked again at our recent Policy & Resources Committee meeting (P&R), we were informed that such assistance is now being provided. If any care-experienced person wishes to contact me about any aspect of the support they are receiving from the Council, please do not hesitate to do so—I am, after all, as a councillor, your corporate parent.

Also at P&R, I was in full agreement with the recommendation not to progress implementation of an overnight visitor levy. All along, because of the significant number of Orkney residents travelling within Orkney for whom it would be appropriate to be exempted from such a charge, I've felt it would be unreasonable to burden our accommodation providers with the additional bureaucracy and responsibility of policing who would be required to pay and who not.

On our British Sign Language Local Plan, I asked if the BSL courses being delivered at KGS and Stromness Academy could also be rolled out to our junior high schools. I was told this is planned, along with Makaton and Sign Supported English. In the item on Orkney Health & Care's revenue expenditure outturn, there was a lot of discussion about our reliance on agency staff because of the perennial difficulty in recruiting that we are experiencing (a nationwide problem). An idea I have been floating around amongst colleagues is that OIC should set up its own agency, which would not only serve us but would be a facility for other local authorities to outsource to, thus solving our recruitment crisis and providing OIC with an additional income stream at one stroke. I am not sure whether the provisions of the Orkney County Council Act 1974 would permit us to do this, or whether we'll have to wait until the Scottish Government grants local authorities "General Power of Competence".

The Rousay, Egilsay, Wyre & Gairsay Community Council, whose meeting I attended virtually, was presented with the figures for the income OIC derives from dues paid by visiting cruise liners. For the 2024/25 financial year, this came to £4,690,626.04 divided into £3,620,845.54 harbour dues, which can only go towards harbour-related expenditure, and £1,069,780.50 passenger dues, which are paid into the County Fund. (The County Fund arises from the provisions of the aforementioned Orkney County Council Act 1974. I won't go into legal and financial detail, but, in terms of this Act, money from this fund may be used "for any other purpose which in the opinion of the Council is solely in the interests of the county or its inhabitants.")

Back in May, I wrote a letter supporting Egilsay Community Association's application for funding from the Scottish Land Fund to purchase the Community Centre and adjoining schoolhouse. I am delighted they have been successful in their application.

It was reported to the Monitoring & Audit Committee that, during the period 1st April 2024 to 31st March 2025, OIC received 327 compliments and 150 complaints (over twice as many compliments as complaints!). I sought reassurance that those members of staff who are complimented are made aware of the fact, and I am pleased to say that we were told that they are.

I attended a seminar on the proposed designs for the 3 new ferries to serve Eday, Sanday, Stronsay & Westray—updated to incorporate key points and suggestions made by the public during the recent consultation events. And I was invited to sit in on a Special Development & Infrastructure Committee meeting at which it was unanimously decided to approve the general design arrangement and commence the procurement process for building them. As I said at the latter, this is a big step towards transforming our ferry fleet into one fit for the 21st Century, however we are already a quarter of the way through that century! We will have to rely on continuing support from the Scottish Government to see this project through to realisation.

We welcomed to Kirkwall our colleagues from Orkney's "parallel universe" (Shetland) to join us for a Valuation Joint Board meeting and training session. It's always a grand opportunity to exchange experiences from our respective domains.

The Sport & Leisure Member/Officer Working Group meeting I attended was dedicated to our swimming pools. Refurbishment of the swimming pools and other recreational facilities in the North Isles was one of the priorities I listed in my 2022 manifesto.

At the Sanday School Parent Council meeting, I was shocked to learn how few of the Outer North Isles pupils were able to participate in the 4-day instrumental course in September in Kirkwall owing to lack of accommodation provision. If your child has been affected by this, please could you get in touch with me (contact details below). I don't want any child left behind.

Other meetings I attended before the start of our short autumn recess included a budget-setting seminar, a meeting of Sanday Community Council, and a General meeting of the Full Council (which, at just under 6 minutes, was the shortest I can remember; the longest, on 4th July 2023, was about 17 times as long, taken up with fanciful notions of self-determination).

In the presence of Orkney's Lord Lieutenant, I was honoured to lay a wreath on behalf of OIC at the HMS Royal Oak memorial at Scapa and drop a bouquet of flowers over the wreck in the Flow (see photograph below) for the 86th anniversary of the sinking of the battleship by the German submarine U-47. I am often asked to do this on behalf of the Council because of my family connection, as my Uncle Ronald was one of 835 who went down with the ship on that fateful night 86 years ago.

"IMPROVING THE CANCER JOURNEY" (ICJ) SERVICE NHS ORKNEY

If you or someone you know has been affected by cancer, *Improving the Cancer Journey* is here to help. *Improving the Cancer Journey*, in partnership with Macmillan, is a dedicated service to support anyone affected by cancer with their non-clinical needs. This could be the person with the cancer diagnosis, or it could be someone affected by that diagnosis, such as family or carers.

When someone is diagnosed with cancer, they often describe feeling like they're in a maze. It can be difficult to know what services are out there and where to access them. The *Improving the Cancer Journey* service is here to support with this, and help people to access the services that can support with their non-clinical concerns.

Non-clinical concerns may include:

- Supporting someone to access local teams that can help with money or housing worries and benefits
- Addressing caring or work responsibilities
- Connecting with those that can support with addressing physical concerns
- Accessing complimentary therapies
- Helping with emotional concerns, connecting with wellbeing support and services
- Accessing information to answer questions or concerns about cancer and treatment

When someone affected by cancer accesses the ICJ service, they will be offered a Holistic Needs Assessment, which is a simple check-list style questionnaire that helps to understand what means most to the person. The key areas addressed within a Holistic Needs Assessment are financial, practical, physical, emotional and spiritual.

Based on this assessment and meaningful conversations with an ICJ Link Worker, a support plan will be created to ensure the person affected by cancer is offered all the support they need.

Patients can be referred into the service through a self-referral form or via a professional referral. Both referral forms, alongside further information, can be found on the ICJ page of the NHS Orkney website - <u>Improving the Cancer Journey (ICJ) | NHS Orkney</u>.




